While other throne have tottered and some have fallen, the British throne seems today more secure than it did twenty-five years ago. There is today less talk in the country of possible Canadian independence or of joining the United States than was evident when Goldwin Smith and others openly espoused a change. As Canadians survey the world they see nothing they prefer to our present British connection. A few irresponsible admirers of Russia point with pride to that country but that is because they are ignorant of the conditions that obtain there. There is more liberty in a square yard of British soil than in a thousand miles of Russian. Changes may be necessary and will be made but we can honestly feel that in no country of the world is it possible to make those changes as easily as in Canada.

The world today, in spite of certain tendencies toward nationalism, is becoming more international. Possibly our sons may see a world in which there will be as close a bond among all nations as between the nations of the British Empire. But that will not make us less Canadian and, let us hope, not less British. May the King live long to carry on his work at the head of a wonderful Empire in which Canada will be among the leaders.
