RESULT IN QUEBEC

It was expected by everyone that the Taschereau Government would be returned to power in the province of Quebec. The party felt itself well entrenched but the old Whig complacency was considerably disturbed by the rise of the young Liberals under Paul Gouin, son of the well known statesman, Sir Lomer Gouin. This group showed radical tendencies and assaulted the Taschereau stronghold with such effect that it retains power only by a narrow majority.

While the Taschereau Government won, the contest was really a great victory for the Young Liberals or "L'Action Libérale Nationale." The name signifies that the members are Liberal and that they are the section of the party that believes in action. The Conservative strength was due largely to a loose alliance it had with these young Liberals.
