## Several Men, Including Two Police, Injured in Interior Strike Clash

Several men, including two police officers, sustained bruises and minor injuries and one relief striker was arrested as a result of a clash between unemployed and police officers this morning on Six Mile Hill, a mile and a half out of Prince George, according to advices received divisional headquarters of the provincial police here.


