In (1) Mr. Stevens is seen, in his latest photograph, at his desk in Ottawa. The Stevens'home in Vancouver (2) from 1910 to 1922 where the three youngest children, Sylvia Mary, Patricia Irene and Douglas Carlyle, were born. The present home in Vancouver at 1903 West Nineteenth Avenue in the Shaughnessy Heights residential district, is shown in (3). In (4) Harry Stevens is seen clearing land on his farm at White Rock, B.C., in 1918, Between sessions in Ottawa, he spends much of his time on the farm, the secret, he claims, for his good health.
