CONSCRIPTION

As a means of preventing Canada from taking part in any future wars, the National Council of the Native Sons of Canada recently sent a letter to all members of Parliament including the Senate urging that the conscription act should be amended in order to provide that in case of war conscription shall apply to all material resources in Canada including all financial resources as well as the human bodies of Canadian citizens and that the law shall come into force immediately upon the declaration of war by Canada.

We do not know exactly what was in the minds of those who sent this letter but we are inclined to think it was something to this effect: The men who make war are the men who usually have money and property. If they know that their money and property is at stake as well as the lives of their neighbors they will be less likely to enter a war as a result of which they may be reduced to the common level of their neighbors.

It is curious that throughout time property has been accounted of more value than human lives. Especially noticeable has it been in time of war. Usually the rich have become richer and the poor poorer as a result of war. If the Native Sons have their way there will be no rich people left once war is declared.

THE CAMPAIGN IS ON

Evidently the federal political campaign has commenced. The Conservative headquarters at Ottawa is already flooding the country with literature and it is evident that money is to be expended lavishly in order to try to perpetuate the life of the present administration.

The latest publication sent out is entitled "The Premier Speaks to the People." This is the fourth of the radio addresses read by the Prime Minister in his January broadcasts and now published in booklet form. It is preceded by a foreword written by L. W. Simms, former president of the Maritime Board of Trade in which the self-sacrifice of the Prime Minister is stressed and he is held up to the public as one of the biggest men Canada has ever known.

The best feature of the booklet is the picture of Mr. Bennett in jovial mood with hat in hand responding to the cheers of the populace.

TRADING IN MINES HIGH

Volume in Toronto in March Highest Since Last July

TORONTO, April 11: (CP)—Volume on the mining section of the Toronto Exchange in March was the heaviest since last July, transactions totalling 26,301,531 shares against 16,749,275 in February. Sales values also were doubled. Higher London prices for gold and the gold tax revision in the Ottawa budget provided the stimulant.

Near the close of the month base metal stocks assumed a more prominent position, influenced by advancing copper, lead and zinc prices and the prospect of an agreement among the big world copper producers to further curtail their output. Silver stocks also displayed a firming tendency.

During March 182 issues appeared on the board of which 71 advanced in price while 87 declined and 24 remained unchanged. The most active issues of the senior group were Teck-Hughes with 127,025 shares changing hands and Hollinger with a turnover of 110,526 shares. In the secondary group McWatters traded 1,534,849 shares for a gain of 61 cents and Central Patricia traded 654,558 shares on an advance of 17 cents.

PREPARE FOR WORK

President Roosevelt Expects His Program to be in Full Operation By Mid November

WASHINGTON, D.C., April 11—In a regular weekly conference with newspapermen, the first following his return from his spring holiday to Florida waters, President Franklin D. Roosevelt stated yesterday that he hoped to have his \$4,800,000,000 public work relief program, which was passed by Congress last week, in full effectiveness by the middle of November. Had it not been for the delay of Congress in adopting it, the President said it would have been in operation a month sooner.
