

Reich President Declined to Intervene and Prevent Beheading; Foreigner's Neck Saved

BERLIN, Feb. 18: (CP)—Baroness Renate von Natzmer and Frau Pebita von Falkenhayn went to their death by beheading yesterday afternoon after Reich President Adolph Hitler had refused to intervene following the sentencing of the women for espionage by stealing military secrets and selling them to Poland. Owing to fear that his execution might reflect upon German-Polish friendship, Baron George Sosnowski, former Polish Army officer, was sentenced to life imprisonment instead of death for the same offence. Thirty persons, ten women and twenty men, were at first involved in the cases.
