Seven Cabinet Leaders Favor Financial and Economic Means Of Handling Ethiopian Crisis

NATIONS TO INTERFERE

Italian Policy May Cause Other European Powers to Take Action—Britain in Key Position

LONDON, Aug. 21.—There were threats last night of interference by more than one nation of Europe against Italy's policy in connection with the Italo-Ethiopian crisis.

Sir Eric Drummond, British ambassador to Rome, has been called to London to attend an emergent meeting of the British cabinet to discuss policy of this country in regard to Italy.

In some quarters it is still felt that Great Britain may do much to obviate the outbreak of war in East Africa by closing the Suez Canal. It is still understood that Great Britain may raise the arms embargo to Ethiopia.

Lewis Stone, Real Gentleman Of Screen, Visits Prince Rupert; Is Just Like One Would Expect

One of the screen's finest gentlemen, the debonair Lewis Stone was a visitor in Prince Rupert yesterday afternoon aboard his two-masted schooner-rigged sailing yacht Serena. Chatting on the deck of the palatial 105-foot vessel, he was interviewed by a representative of the Daily News. Mr. Stone, who as many know was a United States Army officer during the War, was nattily but quietly attired in navy great coat, captain's cap and complete yachting rig. Reserved but gracious, retiring yet completely approachable, with grey hair and close-cropped moustache, twinkling eye and the epitome of affability and gentlemanly personality, possibly getting pretty well along to sixty years of age now. Mr. Stone, from the first glance, was just as one would expect from seeing him on the screen. So often cast in pictures as the urbane and middle-aged gentleman, his private personality appeared to his interviewer to be identical with the widely-familiar and so highly popular screen presence. Meticulous in his choice of words, apparently more disposed to listen than to talk, Mr. Stone did not bring forward the matter of pictures but was ready to discuss the films and to answer questions regarding them. Some how or other, however, the conversation seemed to veer back to yachting and it was quite clear that here is the famous actor's love and hobby.

Full Cabinet Meeting on Thursday Will Further Discuss Policy For Presentation to League of Nations—Also To Talk of Austrian Frontier Situation

LONDON, Aug. 21: (CP)—Seven leaders of the British cabinet today tentatively approved a policy demanding financial and economic action against Italy in the event of attacks being made by that country on Ethiopia. A full cabinet meeting to be held tomorrow will further discuss policy for presentation to the session of the council of the League of Nations to be held early next month. The Austrian frontier situation will also come in for discussion tomorrow.

City of Berlin Has Another Disaster on Its Hands

Los Angeles Will Pay General Tribute to Will Rogers—Post's Body in Oklahoma

BERLIN, Aug. 21.—Following the destruction by fire of the radio exposition building on Monday night with loss of one life, Berlin experienced another major disaster last night when an excavation for a new subway in the centre of the city caved in, trapping 18 men. Police and firemen were working feverishly to extricate the workers, four having been taken out but grave fears being felt for the safety of the others.
