Great Flying Boat Safely Completes Third Successful Trans-Pacific Flight

ALAMEDA, Cal., Oct. 29:-Following its third successful trans-Pacific flight, a three-weeks' trip as far out as Guam, the great flying boat Pan American Clipper landed here from Honolulu with her commander, R. O. D. Sullivan, and crew of seven on board. The hop from Honolulu took seventeen

It is expected the Pan American Clipper will essay a fourth flight across the Pacific about November 15 with Manila as its destination.
