



ACTRESS IS DEAD

Dame Madge Kendal, Once Toast of British Stage, Passes Away At Age of Eighty-Six

LONDON, September 18 (Associated Press) - Dame Madge Kennal, once the toast of the British stage, is dead here at the age of eighty-six years. Her active career on the stage lasting for more than a century, she was known as "the matron of the British drama."

Descended from a family that for generations had been connected with the theatre, she was not quite five years old when, in 1854 in London, she played her first role. Through the rest of the century and into the next the stage was almost her home-in London, in the provinces and in America, where she made her first appearance October 7, 1889 at the Fifth Avenue Theatre, New York.

She was made a Dame Commander of the British Empire in 1926 and a year later was given the grand cross of the order.

Margaret Shafto Robertson was born March 15, 1849, in Grimsby. England, the twenty-second and last child of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Robertson. One of her brothers was T. W. Robertson, a noted drama-

Madge Robertson, as she then was billed, made her debut February 20, 1854, at the old Marylebone theatre as the child Marie in "The Struggle for Gold" and "The Orphan of the Frozen Sea." In succeeding years she took child parts in other productions and in 1855 played Eva in "Uncle Tom's Cabin" in Bristol.

Her talent both as an actress and as a singer secured her numerous engagements. She was a singing fairy in "A Midsummer Night's Dream" in 1863 with Ellen Province Adopts Plan to Assist Terry as Titania and by 1865 she was playing Ophelia and Desdomona in the Haymarket, London.
