Britain Asked to Defend France Against New Navy to Be Built by the German Government

PARIS, June 21: (CP)—Premier Laval told Captain Anthony Eden today that France was dissatisfied with the Anglo-German navy agreement. Their conversations were interrupted in the middle of the afternoon though the French Premier avoided anything approaching an open breach. 

IN FAVOR HIGHWAY

Premier Pattullo Would Grant No Provincial Lands to Help Construction

VICTORIA, June 21:- That British Columbia would not grant any lands as means of financing construction of the Alaska Highway was indicated in a statement yesterday by Premier Pattullo. The statement was made following a suggestion in Washington by G. M. Murray M.L.A. for Lillooet that the province might consider such grants. The Premier said that otherwise he very much approved the building of an international highway from Alaska to Patagonia.
