PLANS FOR REFUNDING

Nearly everybody has a plan for refunding just now. The legislature will be asked to give legality to a scheme for reducing the interest rate on all Prince Rupert bonds. Vancouver has a refunding scheme for cutting the interest rate in half but it is not likely to succeed on that basis. Undoubtedly they will refund but at a higher rate of interest than asked by Mayor McGeer. The province has a big refunding scheme on hand with the idea of saving the province six million dollars a year. The Dominion must also refund its debt, cutting interest rate nearly in half if it is to survive and carry out the needed public works. Everywhere there seems to be a war on interest rates. It is rather hard on the men who invested their savings in a certain type of security expecting that they would have something to rely on in their old age. It is also hard on the insurance companies that thought they were investing policyholders' money in sound securities. But then the depression was hard on everyone. Some lost their life savings and others have lost their businesses while many thousands scarcely managed to keep their heads above water during the troublous times and it will take years to recover. We pity the investors who are hurt but they have the consolation that all are in the same boat. Everybody has been hurt more or less by the depression.
