BARNUM IN THIS TOWN

Wallace Beery Plays Part of Great Showman in Week-End Picture At Capitol

Wallace Beery appears on the screen of the Capitol Theatre here this week-end in the title role of "The Mighty Barnum" and the comedy mood of the great showman's extravagant exploits is well suited to Beery's most popular type of characterization.

The story opens with Barnum's entrance into the sideshow business of a hundred years ago when, having acquired a few reptile monstrosities and an aged negress purported to be 160 years old, he left his failing Bowery grocery, rented a livery stable and opened Barnum's American Museum. The famous midget, General Tom Thumb, and his bride Lavinia, the Bearded Lady, the Fiji Mermaid, the Woolly Horse and all the rest of the "natural oddities" with which Barnum staggered the New York of his day are also seen. His splurge from the grotesque to the sublime with the sponsoring of the American debut of Jenny Lind, the lovely Swedish nightingale, plays a big part in the picture with Virginia Bruce charmingly interpreting the golden-voiced Jenny.

Adolphe Menjou, Rochelle Hudson and Janet Beecher are also importantly cast.

Halibut Fishing Now Permissible—Naden Harbor Crab Cannery Opens—Armour Makes More Purchases.

Much Sunshine, Little Rain And Moderate Temperature During February Here

With a goodly measure of sunshine, little if any snow, "only a small amount of rain and very moderate temperature, Prince Rupert enjoyed a very pleasant month during February from the weather standpoint. There was 62.6 hours of sunshine, as compared with 80 hours in the same month last year, and 3.5 inches of rain in comparison with 5.06 inches in February 1934. So far this year there has been 100.5 hours of sunshine here as against 86.6 hours in the opening two months of 1934 while the rainfall for 1935 to date has amounted to 10.34 inches as against 27.96 inches in the corresponding period of 1934.

The weather summary for the month of February, as announced today by the Dominion meteorologist at Digby Island, is as follows:

Highest barometer reading at sea level, 30.58 on February 18.

Lowest barometer reading at sea level, 29.31 on February 13.

Maximum temperature, 53 on February 15.

Minimum temperature, 28 on February 4.

Mean temperature, 40.1.

Precipitation, 3.5 inches.

Sunshine, 62.6 hours.

Today marks the legal opening of the halibut fishing season for the year in Pacific waters. No vessels of the regular fleet have, however, gone out as yet and it will be March 15 at the earliest before they start the season's operations. Possibly it may be April 1. Much will depend upon how frozen fish stocks are cleaned up during the coming few weeks. The Prince Rupert fleet is also awaiting the outcome of minimum price negotiations for the season between the boat owners and fishermen of Seattle and the fish buyers. There was to have been another conference on this matter at Seattle on Wednesday but, up to last night, no word had been received here as to the outcome of the meeting. The fact that no word has been received is taken to mean that no agreement was reached. Although the regular fleet is not operating yet, it is very likely that there will be fresh halibut on the local market by the end of the week from Indians or hand fishermen operating in the vicinity of the harbor.

There were forty-four passengers arriving here aboard the steamer Princess Norah which was in port from 3:45 to 5:30 yesterday afternoon southbound from Skagway to Vancouver. The vessel disembarked five passengers here while three sailed from this port aboard her for the south.

Armour Salvage Co.'s power tug Pachena, Capt. Reg Green, is due back in port today from Anyox, having in tow a logging donkey and the gasboat Covelite, formerly the Granby Co.'s service boat prior to the building of the Granby several years ago.
