



## Angry Seas Bring Death and Destruction



Heavy storms on the Atlantic and in English Channel did much damage to shipping and caused loss of many sailors' lives. At the gale-battered freighter Broomhampton, England, on the end of a towline from a pair of tugs. The "hurricane" which swept the English Channel almost sank the Manor. Captain Harry Turner, was lost when a mighty sea tore away the entire bridge and swept it overboard. The ship drifted for two days before she was located by a destroyer. ## WATERFRONT WHIFFS

**Halibut Landings Over Ten Million Pound Mark—  
Lysekil in Trouble on Northern Fishing  
Grounds—Much Ketchikan Fish Moving**

Halibut landings at the port of Prince Rupert for the year 1935 went over the ten million pound mark during the past week when 347,500 pounds was brought in of which 111,000 pounds was from Canadian vessels and 236,500 pounds from American boats. The total for the season is now 10,270,300 pounds of which 4,796,000 pounds has been from Canadian boats and 5,474,300 pounds from American. Prices during the week were not quite so high as the week previous, the top bid for Canadian fish being 8.3c and 6c which the Sea Maid was paid for 23,000 pounds and the low 7c and 6c which the Capella and Covenant received for catches of 20,000 and 26,000 pounds respectively. For American fish the high price of the week was 11c and 6c which the Betty, Glacier, Garland and Superior were paid for 2,000, 10,000, 10,500 and 28,000 pounds respectively and the low 7.6c and 6c which the Atlas received for 34,000 pounds.

Making her final voyage of the season on the Alaska route, C. P. R. steamer Princess Louise, Capt. K. Gray, arrived in port at 9 o'clock this morning from the south with a light list of passengers and sailed a couple of hours later for Skagway and other northern points whence she is due back here next Thursday afternoon south-bound. After this voyage the Princess Louise will be replaced for the winter by the Princess Norah. The vessel had 35 passengers on board of whom four disembarked here seven going north aboard her.

Late again on account of having had heavy cargoes of canned salmon to load at cannery points, Union steamer Cardena, Capt. Ernest Georgeson, arrived in port at 10 o'clock this morning from the south and sailed three and a-half hours later on her return to Vancouver and waypoints. Rivers Inlet points have now been added to the Cardena's list of calls on the northern voyage.

Arthur Graves, popular purser of the steamer Princess Adelaide, is now ashore in Vancouver on his annual month's vacation. David Scott, purser from one of the southern boats, is relieving him on the Adelaide.

To pick up and bring back here the well known halibut boat Lysekil, Capt. Al Wole, which lost her propeller and had her rudder and sternpost damaged in a recent storm while fishing on the grounds of Area No. 3, the Armour Salvage Co.'s power tug Algie, with Capt. Paul Armour in command, left on Thursday morning on a long trip to Cordova, Alaska. It is expected the Algie will be back in about ten days.

Armour Salvage Co.'s power tug Daly, Capt. Charlie Edwards, was back last night after a trip to Port Essington with sawdust and lumber to be used by the Department of Indian Affairs in connection with the installation of a new water system for the village. The Daly had left for Simpson Thursday night.

C. P. R. steamer Princess Adelaide, Capt. Anderson, arrived in port at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon from Vancouver and waypoints and sailed at 10 p.m. on her return south.

J. R. Ballantyne, chief engineer, and A. H. Robson, purser, were among members of the crew of the steamer Prince Rupert going south to Vancouver on the Prince George Thursday night. The Prince Rupert has been tied up at the local dry dock for the winter.

### Island Seining Closes

All seining areas on the Queen Charlotte Islands were closed to fishing yesterday, leaving the Rivers Inlet area the only one in Prince Rupert district still open to fishing. With the closing of fishing on the Islands, the Canadian Fishing Co.'s cannery at Lagoon Bay, the only one on the Queen Charlottes to operate this year, closes down. Namu cannery of the B. C. Packers near Queen Charlotte Islands, packing Rivers Inlet fish, is the only cannery plant still in operation in the district.

Two Ketchikan steamers were in port early Thursday with fish cargoes for trans-shipment east over Canadian National Railways. The Northland Transportation Co.'s steamer North Sea, Capt. A. W. Nickerson, arrived at 12:30 midnight and, after discharging two carloads of canned salmon, sailed for Seattle. The freighter Evelyn Berg, Capt. C. L. Ross, arrived at 10 o'clock Thursday morning and, after discharging six carloads of frozen fish and one of fresh halibut, sailed the same evening for Seattle.

**Decree and Alimony of \$850 Per Month is Granted Against Celebrated Actor**

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 12.—Dolores Costello Barrymore has been granted a decree of divorce from John Barrymore on the grounds of perversity. She was granted alimony of \$850 monthly to support herself and three children. Mrs. Barrymore claimed that her actor-husband drank excessively, continually used vile language and often struck her. On one occasion, after an Alaskan cruise aboard their yacht Infanta, he became so abusive that it was necessary for her to return home to California with her children by train.

## Pound Sterling and Canadian Dollar On New York Exchange

NEW YORK, Oct. 12.—The British pound sterling closed at \$4.90 1/2 on the local foreign exchange market as compared with \$4.97 1/2 in Montreal. The Canadian dollar closed here at 98 29-32c.



## Rotarians Hear Personal Address On Rotary Objects

Amos Ayres, from Rotary headquarters at Chicago, gave a very interesting address to the members of the Prince Rupert Rotary Club Thursday at the weekly luncheon in the Commodore Cafe. President W. M. Blackstock in the chair. He spoke of club service, vocational service, community service and international service, some clubs devoting their energies to one or more of the fourfold objectives and others confining themselves to one or two. What was applicable to clubs in the United States or Canada might not be suitable for clubs in China or Japan or Russia or some other country.

The speaker said there were now 3860 clubs of which 2600 were in Canada and the United States. Paul Harris, the founder of Rotary and originator of the service club idea, was still active occasionally at the head office although he was getting on in years.


