Editor, Daily News:-

At the request of a number of local trade unions, the following outline of facts concerning the Trades & Labor Congress of Canada and the associated labor movement in Prince Rupert is submitted for your readers' perusal:

The Trades & Labor Congress of Canada, of which the Prince Rupert Trades & Labor Council and affiliated unions are members, is distinctly a Canadian organization, uncontrolled directly or indirectly by the American Federation of Labor or any other body.

The policy of the Congress is not made by the A. F. of L. but is determined in annual convention by delegates from Trades Councils and affiliated local unions in Canada. Each union or council has an equal status in the matter of delegates. One official fraternal delegate only, attends the convention as a epresentative of the A. F. of L.

Membership in the Congress is not confined to Canadian branches International Unions. An exremely large number of purely loeal Canadian unions are affiliated and participate to a large extent in administrative affairs.

The Trades & Labor Congress of Canada has a membership greatly in excess of any other labor federation in Canada, and has primarily formulated and sponsored, in the interest of Canadian workers, practically all social legislation in effect throughout the Dominion.

The Congress has always maintained close fraternal relations, not only with the American Federation 1.40 of Labor, but also with the British .02 Trades Union movement.
