BRITISH MINERS' STRIKE IS MOOTED

Executive Committee Authorized By Heavy Vote to Call Men Out

Action May be Resorted to Unless Demand For Forty-Eight Cent Per Day Increase in Pay For Colliery Workers is Not Met

BARNESLEY, Eng., Nov. 20: (CP)—Members of the Miners' Federation of Great Britain, it was officially announced today, have voted ninety-three per cent strong to empower the executive committee to call a nation-wide strike if such action is found necessary in order to enforce the demand for a 48c per day increase in wages.

LIQUOR BUSINESS SHOWS BIG INCREASE

British Columbia In Spending Mood Again, Booze Turnover Shows

Profits Are Highest Since Boom Days With Large Increases Both in Gross Receipts and Their Excess of Costs

VICTORIA, Nov. 20: (CP)—Indicating that British Columbia is in a spending mood again, the provincial government announced today that liquor profits for the six months ending September 30 were the highest since the boom days of 1929 despite reduced prices.

MONEY FOR FISHERMEN

Nickerson Tells Vancouver Of Benefits From Duty Change On Halibut—Toronto Men Fearful

VANCOUVER, Nov. 20:—G. W. Nickerson of Prince Rupert, who is a visitor here, said yesterday that the reduction of the duty on halibut entering the United States from Canada would mean \$60,000 a year more money for British Columbia coast halibut fishermen.

Commenting on the agreement, Mr. Nickerson said it would place halibut boats operating out of Prince Rupert in as good a position as those out of Seattle and should raise the price of halibut by half a cent a pound.

The Prince Rupert broker came here to meet Mrs. Nickerson who arrived yesterday on the Empress of Japan from a trip to Honolulu on which she was accompanied by Mrs. F. G. Brynildsen of Victoria.

TOMATO GROWERS FEARFUL VICTORIA, Nov. 20:—Hothouse tomato growers of Vancouver Island are fearful of the effects of the new reciprocity treaty with the United States which provides for a lowering of duties on fruits and vegetables.

TO STAY IN CHINA

General Chang Kai Shek Averts Secession of Five Provinces, It Is Claimed

PEIPING, China, Nov. 20:—General Chang Kai Shek, Chinese war lord, was reported today to have averted the complete loss by the Nationalist government of five provinces in North China as a result of a compromise which had been arranged with Japan.

Under the agreement, the provinces concerned would be governed by commissions, not being completely removed from under the Nationalist government but under a working agreement with Tokyo.

There would be Japanese agents in an advisory capacity.

REASON FOR MOVE

TOKYO, Nov. 20:—The campaign for political independence of North China from the Nanking government is attributed by Japanese Foreign Office spokesmen in part as a result of the United States silver purchase policy which intensifies China's economic troubles, and Great Britain's support of Nanking currency reform.

VAGUE BUT GRAVE

LONDON, Nov. 20: (CP)—Great Britain is holding her hand in North China. "Vague but grave" is today's description in British official circles of the new trouble from Japan and China.

WAS SHOT IN WOODS

Murdoch McKenzie Victim of Hunting Accident at Digby Island—Not Serious

Murdoch McKenzie is in Prince Rupert General Hospital this afternoon with a gunshot wound in the left thigh as a result of a hunting accident at Digby Island at 12:30 noon today.

William McGilp and McKenzie were hunting on Digby Island. McKenzie was ahead and McGilp being both halibut and salmon and accidentally discharged and McKenzie was shot.

The accident occurred at 12:30 and McKenzie was immediately brought to hospital.

CANADA MAKES DECISION REGARDING SANCTIONS; SHIP ALLOWED TO COAL

Genoa Bound Vessel at Sydney With Scrap Iron—Ethiopia Claims Victory Over Italy in East Africa Fighting

OTTAWA, Nov. 20: (CP)—The Canadian government made its first decision yesterday under the sanctions against Italy to which the Dominion has subscribed when the United States freighter Farnham, bound from Boston to Genoa with a cargo of scrap iron, was allowed to take on only enough coal at Sydney, Nova Scotia, to complete her voyage to Genoa.

Status on Fuel

GENEVA, Nov. 20: (CP)—The status of coal and oil under the League of Nations sanctions program against Italy is to be determined at a meeting of the sanctions committee of eighteen next Monday.

Private Gold Drawn On

ROME, Nov. 20: (CP)—Private holdings of gold in Italy will be drawn upon by the government in the effort to combat the financial penalties being imposed upon the country by the League of Nations sanctions program, it was announced yesterday.

Italian Reverse

ADDIS ABABA, Nov. 20:—Ethiopia last night claimed victory for its forces over the Italians on the southern front, declaring that the Italian advance had been turned back near Gorrabel with heavy casualties on both sides.

There were also indications that the Italian advance from the north had been halted. There was a tendency to question if such heavy casualties as claimed by the Italians had been actually inflicted upon the Ethiopians south of Ma-

JELlicoe IS DEAD

Famous British Admiral Dies Today at Age of Seventy-Six Years

LONDON, Nov. 20: (CP)—Lord Jellicoe, outstanding British naval figure in the Great War, died today at the age of seventy-six. He rose to greatest fame as commander of the Grand Fleet at the Battle of Jutland in 1916.

DUNDEE LIFEBOAT

DUNDEE, Scotland, Nov. 20: (CP)—An anonymous gift of \$35,000 from a woman has resulted in the Dundee branch of the Royal National Lifeboat Institution having a new lifeboat.

TRADE AGREEMENT WITH NEW ZEALAND

Stock Market Is On Upgrade Again

New High Ground Reached Yesterday Despite Heavy Turnover Of Nearly 3,000,000 Shares

NEW YORK, Nov. 20:—The stock market advanced to new high ground yesterday with many issues reaching new highs for the year. A total of 2,880,000 shares changed hands and closing averages were as follows: industrials, 148.44, up 1.38; rails, 29.73, up .32; bonds, 98.82, up .12.

MONTREAL, Nov. 20: (CP)—The British pound sterling closed at \$4.97 1/2 on the local exchange market yesterday. In New York it was \$4.92 1/2.

LEADER OF NEW PARTY

J. H. Blackmore Of Lethbridge To Head Social Creditors At Ottawa—Caucus At Edmonton

EDMONTON, Nov. 20:—Thirteen of fifteen federal members of the Social Credit party, meeting here yesterday in connection with the caucus of federal, provincial and municipal members, tentatively chose J. H. Blackmore of Lethbridge to be leader of the group in the House of Commons at Ottawa. Final decision was left open until the choice has been approved by two Saskatchewan Social Credit members who were unable to be present.

The Social Credit caucus, over which Premier William A. Aberhart is presiding, has been in almost continuous session since Monday and is not expected to conclude until tomorrow, so interesting and great are the problems, mainly in regard to provincial affairs, which are being discussed.

Hon. E. C. Manning, provincial secretary, spoke today on the work of his department.

Both federal and provincial members were guests of the government at a dinner last night.

In the last provincial election, Mr. Hogan won 5345 to 2711 over Mr. Burton who just managed to save his deposit on that occasion.

Man, Woman and Son Of Durham, Ontario, Lose Lives In Auto Collision
