British Columbia In Spending Mood Again, Booze Turnover Shows

Profits Are Highest Since Boom Days With Large Increases Both in Gross Receipts and Their **Excess of Costs**

VICTORIA, Nov. 20: (CP)—Indicating that British Columbia is in a spending mood again, the provincial government announced today that liquor profits for the six months ending September 30 were the highest since the boom days of 1929 despite reduced prices. Sales amounted to \$5,400,000, an increase of \$430,000 over the same period last year, while profits amounted to \$1,125,000, an increase of \$200,000.
