Rev. John Linney Addresses Special Pentecostal Meeting

Last evening a special service was held in the Pentecostal Assembly and Rev. John Linney of Terrace' spoke before a good attendance.

Mr. Linney took his text from John 5-43: "I am come in My Father's Name, and ye receive me not. If another shall come in his own name, him ye will receive." Lord Ponsonby had discussed recently the possibility of a dictator for Great Britain and, although hel stated there was no revolutionary movement ready to explode nor anyone capable or desirous of fostering it, the fact remained that dictators were a topic of the day.

The world has now eleven countries governed by dictators. Before any of these could grasp the reins of government, the country must be in such condition that it was unable to govern. A complete collapse of the present system was at hand. World conditions, in the opnion of all in a position to know, alled for a man of super-power to ake control and set the wheels of prosperity going and to restore order and peace in the world.

Mr. Linney then showed how the Gentile dominion began with Babylon and in the reign of Nebuchadnezzar was controlled by a political religious dictatorship.


