Row-boat ferries were established in seven or eight districts as Top photo shows. Railway lines, telephone companies, power plants and bus lines all suffered a heavy toll of damage. Landslides were reported at many points on Vancouver Island, disrupting traffic and endangering lives. Twenty-two people lost their lives throughout the province as result of storms.
