Grotto Basketball Team Home From Anyox With Northern B.C. Hoop Championship Tucked Away

Bringing with them the Sun Life Assurance Co. cup, emblematic of Northern British Columbia senior basketball championship, the Grotto Senior League hoop team of Prince Rupert, in command of Manager Bud Barrie, returned home last night from Anyox aboard the cannery tender Jedway.

Anyox won the final game at the smelter town Saturday night by a score of 27 to 18 but Prince Rupert took the series with an excess of 18 points on the aggregate. Five games were played, the first being a draw while, of the other four, each team won two. The total count was 126 for Prince Rupert to 108 for Anyox, the results game by game having been as follows:

- First—Anyox, 21; Prince Rupert, 21.
- Second—Anyox, 15; Prince Rupert, 36.
- Third—Anyox, 24; Prince Rupert, 33.
- Fourth—Anyox, 19; Prince Rupert, 16.
- Fifth—Anyox, 27; Prince Rupert, 18.

This is the first time the Sun Life Cup has been away from Anyox. In the final last year, Anyox defeated the Canadian National Recreation Association of the local Senior League.

Alex Macdonald was the star for Anyox in the games at the smelter town, being used in various positions with equal advantage. The Prince Rupert players all turned in a good all around game and there was little to pick and choose between them.

The visit at Anyox proved very enjoyable. There was a dance at the I. O. D. E. Hall, there on Friday evening. The locals found golf and tennis going strong at the smelter town and enjoyed play themselves.

The local team consisted of Sonny Stiles, Ditto Gurvich, Ernie Ratchford, Herbie Morgan, Johnny Morrison, Angus McPhee, Eddie Smith, William Murray and Joe Gillis.
