SHIPPING MESSAGE

States Requires Strong Merchant Marine - Roosevelt In Favor of Subsidies

WASHINGTON D.C., March 5 -President Franklin D. Roosevelt, delivering his long deferred message to Congress on shipping yesterday, declared himself in favor of a strong merchant marine which was vital to the United States, especially in case of war. He advocated a system of direct subsidies to shipping companies instead of government loans which he asserted had not been successful. The greater cost of operating American ships than foreign vessels, owing to higher wage scales, better living conditions, etc., should be taken into account.
