MESSAGE OF PREMIER

The first of a series of messages by Premier Pattullo to the people of British Columbia is being broadcast through the newspapers instead of by radio. In that way it is possible for all to read the message and those who wish to study it may refer to it again and again if they so wish. In a message of this kind it is possible to quote figures inteligibly. Such figures given over the radio would have little or no meaning.

In this first message, which appeared yesterday Premier Pattullo explains the position of the provincial government in regard to unemployment.
