Cancer is looked upon by the medical profession as "Public Enemy Number One," in that it is very difficult to cure except in its early stages of development and often it is not detected until too late for a

The Premier's address was broad-Dr. Large then explained the development of cancer in the body. As all knew, the body was developed from a single cell. These increased by a process of division, very rapidly during about the first twenty years of life. Then the increase in the number of cells was only sufficient to repair the wear of the body.
