A peaceful auction of seized cattle in Fermoy, Ireland, turned suddenly, on July 13 to a scene of confusion and rioting as women gathered at the sale indulged in stone-and-egg throwing at policemen who tried to disperse them. In this picture a squa !ron of police, some of them shown reaching for their guns, are seen charging the group of women at the left, who bravely stood their ground for a time. The riots grew out of the Catholic-Protestant quarrels during an Orangemen's celebration in Fermoy and Belfast. At least six were killed and hundreds injured in these riots.
