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WATERFRONT WHIFFS

Sockeye Packing Season Commencing — Halibut Landings Picking Up—Slight Improvement in Trolling

The 1935 salmon canning season starts in Prince Rupert district early next week with the opening at midnight tomorrow of fishing with sockeye nets. Twenty-six canneries, nine on the Skeena River, will be in operation in the district. The opening price for sockeye is 45c per fish which seems to be satisfactory to all concerned. Just before the opening date, there has been a rush of boats to take out licences, the most of fishermen having deferred the securing of licences until the last moment pending the settlement of the season's price. B. A. Cannery at Port Essington was the first plant on the Skeena to actually start canning this year, having already put up some sprigs prior to the opening of sockeye fishing. A test boat took two hundred sockeye during the past week. This would indicate that the fish are none too plentiful but there are hopes that there will be an early improvement. At least, the fish are in sight.

Halibut landings at the port of Prince Rupert for the 1935 season up to and including yesterday had reached a total of 4,588,150 pounds as compared with 7,392,565 pounds up to the corresponding date last year. This year's landings from Canadian boats now totals 2,119,150 pounds in comparison with 3,448,565 pounds last year while American landings this year aggregate 2,469,000 pounds as against 3,944,000 pounds last year. For the week ending yesterday landings amounted to 440,500 pounds of which 164,500 pounds was from Canadian boats and 276,000 pounds from American vessels. Prices showed a somewhat lower tendency during the week, the top bid for Canadian fish being 6.2c and 5c which the Gony received for 15,500 pounds and the low 5.5c and 4c which several boats were paid. For American fish the high price of the week was 7.7c and 5.5c which the Lumen and Ionic were paid for catches of 11,500 and 16,000 pounds respectively and the low 6c and 5.5c which was paid in many cases.

A slight improvement in the spring salmon run on fishing grounds contiguous to Prince Rupert is reported during the past week. There is much, however, still to be desired. All in all, it has been rather a slow spring for the trollers.

Dr. H. N. Brocklesby, associate chemist of the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station, returned to Prince Rupert on the Princess Adelaide last night after a two weeks' trip south. He delivered lectures before the Vancouver Medical Association on the subject of vitamins and also visited Victoria and Seattle on business. He was accompanied by his young daughter, Pat.

Despite none too promising weather, several angling parties are planned for the forthcoming holiday week-end, a number of which will get away this evening. Several are going out to Falls River while Khtada, Woodworth Lake, etc. will attract others.

C. P. R. steamer Princess Adelaide, Capt. Anderson, arrived in port at 9:15 last evening from the south and sailed at 11 p.m. on her return to Vancouver and waypoints.

There was a somewhat unusual operation at the machine shop of the local dry dock this morning when the re-moulding took place of a Thornycroft engine from the fisheries patrol cruiser Beldis which has been undergoing extensive repairs following the cracking of a cylinder. It is not often that such an intricate job is undertaken.

Of special interest here this week-end is the visit to Prince Rupert in connection with the organization of the Pacific Coast halibut marketing board of E. E. Hopper, secretary of the Dominion Marketing Board, and Dr. Booth who arrived by train this afternoon from Ottawa. Preparatory to their arrival, a meeting of the recently created board was to be held last night but there was no quorum.

A radio broadcast from Vancouver Thursday night announced the

drowning at Buccaneer Bay of the father of Conrad Segavig of Langara Island and of Henry Segavig of Boswell Cannery in Rivers Inlet. Led by Petty Officer Instructor Ross, a working party of Sea Cadets left this morning for Tugwell Island to get the annual camp site in readiness preparatory to the arrival of the main camping party tomorrow. Tents will be erected, provisions stocked and other work done by the advance guard. The Cadets will spend two weeks in camp. Local yachtmen are providing transportation for them.

The Fishing Gazette for June, just to hand, contains the following interesting information: "Groundfish landed week ending May 30, 138 arrivals, 5,214,600 pounds. During the same period the mackerel fleet landed at all New England ports 1,298,000 pounds mostly large and medium. Total mackerel catch to date, 6,307,000 pounds. Prices ranged from 1 3/4c to 2 1/2c for seine fish and 2 1/4c to 2 1-3c per pound for net. Groundfish supply is good but prices are low."

No boats being in with catches, there was no sale of halibut on the local Fish Exchange this morning.

Returning south after a regular voyage to Skagway and other Alaska points with a full list of tourist passengers, C. P. R. steamer Princess Louise, Capt. S. K. Gray, is due in port at 4 o'clock this afternoon from the north and will sail at 5:30 p.m. for Vancouver.


