Aeroplanes To Rescue of Seven Men Marooned On Ice Floe



While setting up their huts for winter fishing, seven men on an ice floe were cast adrift on Lake Simcoe, Ont., in sub-zero weather, for more than 24 hours. Several attempts to reach the men, who were in a perilous position, proved abortive and two aeroplanes were called into use. The first of these was able to drop food to the marooned men. After spending more than 24 hours on the ice, four men were able to get ashore by boat. The other three were finally able to walk ashore.
