With this check list as a guide you can put any bicycle through a searching examination, or you can use it to compare one make of bicycle with another. If you are a boy, show this check list to your dad. Go over it with him point by point before you go with him to the bicycle dealer's. Then you'll both know all the important points to look for in a bicycle and be able to buy one in an expert way.

1— Hanger	The crank hanger (the power plant of the bicycle) should have fine adjustment, with free running large ball bearings, no tight spots. C.C.M. Triplex and one-piece hangers meet all these specifications and are perfectly balanced.	11— Bright Parts	These should be chromium plated over a high-class nickel plate foundation. Then they'll withstand weather and retain their beauty. The C.C.M. nickel foundation is so superior it has become known as 20-Year Nickel.
2- Drive	To avoid waste of pedalling effort, the bicycle should have a Straight Line Drive. The C.C.M. Drive is so straight and true that front and back wheels track like one, and both sprockets line up truly.	12— Ball Races	To withstand friction, these should be carburized to a liberal depth, not merely "skin hardened." All C.C.M. pedals have these features, particularly the Gibson pedal which has a one-piece aluminum frame and secured rubbers.	17— Accuracy	Every part of a bicycle should be accurately made so as to fit properly and the finished bicycle to run truly. C.C.M. parts are accurately made.
7— Wheels	Rims should be chromium plated or enamelled steel. The spokes should be of rustless steel, having a high tensile strength and shock resistant. C.C.M. wheels have these features, are carefully built and hand trued.	18— Trued Up	The hicycle should be "trued up" before it leaves the factory so that it will track perfectly, run evenly, balance exactly and steer easily. The expense of "truing up" is never peglected in a C.C.M.
8— Saddle	Should be smart, light in weight, comfortably shaped and with easy-riding springs. The C.C.M. saddles are carefully chosen.	19— Service Parts	Service parts should be readily obtainable and at reasonable prices. Gemine C.C.M. parts, fairly priced, can be obtained promptly from C.C.M. dealers all over Canada.
9— Tires	Should be of the highest grade. 
