system. Patching up capitalism by social legislation and public works would not suffice. Capitalism, based on the sacredness of material wealth, must be replaced by socialism, based upon the sacredness of human life and welfare, not property.

How was the worker to obtain control? Not by armed revolution, the speaker thought. There were only a few in Canada who advocated that, he believed. The means of obtaining control, Mr. Clarke believed, should be, "instead, by getting hold of Parliamentary procedure. There must be a campaign of education. Unless the people understood what socialism was about, it was useless to put in a socialist government. The speaker regretted that the press, dominated by the interests, was not with the socialistic movement. One alternative was to parade. The relief camp men had had to go to Vancouver to draw attention to conditions under which they were kept. Jesus had gone from Galilee to Jerusalem because Jerusalem was the capital.

"I am heart and soul with the movement," declared the speaker, "and I apologize to no one. Co-operation and sacrifice are necessary. If we are going to get anything worthwhile, we must pay for it. Nothing in the world can stop this movement. The world will overthrow any movement that crushes humanity. We are moving in the right direction with a humanizing movement. Let us hope that some day before long we will get there."

**Other Speakers**

Charles Chapman spoke on some current questions such as the Corbin strike, the need of the unemployed and their families for more adequate relief including boots and clothing, relief camp conditions, work and wages. Premier Pattullo's days were numbered, he asserted. He charged that the banks were behind the boat owners in the dispute here with the halibut fishermen who were fighting to raise the standard of living.

Oscar Larsen declared that the workers had fought with success in the past for better conditions and would do so again. He advocated the abolition of the wage system and its replacement by a plan whereby the worker received the full proceeds of his labor and under which production would be for use and not for profit. The working classes should also fight against war and dictatorships. He called for fifteen seconds' silence in respect to the memory of those who had sacrificed their lives in the interests of the workers.

O. Whyte presented an explanation of the objects of the Canadian Labor Defence League. One of its most important functions was to protect those who were active on behalf of labor from unjust court proceedings and frame-ups.

Announcement was made of the inability of J. E. Panter, C. C. F. candidate for Skeena in the federal election, to attend the meeting.

Announcement was also made of an unemployed tea and sale to be held on May 16 and a whist drive the same evening.

Coast freighter Salvor, Capt. Albert Georgeson, was in port overnight with general cargo for local delivery.

**NEW YORK, May 2:**—Tommy Tomlinson, who had left Los Angeles at 7:54 Tuesday morning, set his Douglas robot transport plane down at Floyd Bennett Field here after having made a new record of eleven hours, five minutes and forty-five seconds for a transcontinental flight. The time was twenty-eight minutes less than the previous record mark.

The plane gave an excellent performance despite conditions on some parts of the route which were far from favorable. Dust-storms were encountered. The average speed was 200 miles per hour.

**Grass Fires Kept Department Busy In April Month**

The city fire department responded to an unusually large number of eighteen alarms during the month of April, all but three of which were accounted for by grass fires due to the dry weather. Only in two cases was damage done. A roof fire on April 2 at the residence on Borden Street owned by Mrs. G. W. Kerr and occupied by J. S. Irvine did damage of \$37.45 while \$10 damage was done by a roof fire at the shop of B. M. Simpson on McBride Street on April 13. There was one false alarm and fourteen grass fires.

In April last year there were five alarms. So far this year there have been thirty-seven fire calls as compared with twenty-six in the first four months of 1934.
