## DR. CARTER IS SPEAKER

Parent Teachers' Association Hears About Work of Fisheries Experimental Station

### Value to City

Interesting Facts and Figures: Vancouver Would Like to Have It

That the building and equipping of the Fisheries Experimental Station in Prince Rupert representing an investment of almost \$100,000, by the federal government of Canada was evidence of its faith not only in the efficacy and importance of experimental scientific research in connection with the improvement of the fisheries industry in Canada but was also evidence of its faith in the future development of Prince Rupert; that this investment results in considerable direct and indirect financial benefit to the city and district, and that certain fishing interests in the south have expressed the opinion that the station should have been placed in Vancouver were important statements made by Dr. N. M. Carter, director of the Prince Rupert station, in an address before the Prince Rupert Parent Teachers' Association on Wednesday evening in the Borden Street School.

Dr. Carter explained that, in addition to several sub-stations, the Biological Board of Canada operated four main stations—the Atlantic Biological Station at St. Andrews, N.B., the Atlantic Fisheries Experimental Station at Halifax, N.S., the Pacific Biological Station at Departure Bay, and the Pacific (Continued on Page Four)

## Merchant, Who Sat For Years in Ottawa House, Is Slain In His Store

W. K. Baldwin, Aged 78, Slugged Over Head, Injuries Causing Him to Succumb—Arrest Made in United States in Connection With Killing

BALDWIN MILLS, Que., April 20: (CP)—W. K. Baldwin, aged 78, former Liberal Member of Parliament for Stanstead, was murdered in his store here Friday and the contents of the cash register stolen. Early today Kenneth Brown of Milton was arrested in St. Alban's, Vermont, in connection with the slaying.

Mr. Baldwin was found unconscious behind the counter with a paper bag stuffed in his mouth and his arms and legs bound with ropes. He died shortly afterwards as a result of injuries, his head having been smashed in by blows from a club.

Mr. Baldwin was a Liberal and for many years had sat as Stanstead's member at Ottawa. He did not seek re-election at the 1930 election.

The Conservative nominating convention for the federal riding of Skeena has been called for the morning of May 24 and it is announced that Ex-Mayor Cyril H. Orme, popular pioneer druggist of the city and three times chief magistrate, has agreed to allow his name to go before the convention as a candidate. It is considered certain that he will be the choice of the party, making the third candidate in the field, the others being Olof Hanson M. P., Liberal, and J. E. Panter of Smithers, C. C. F. Mr. Orme was born at Lucan, Middlesex County, Ontario, 49 years ago and has lived in Prince Rupert since 1908. He has long been active in public affairs and, besides the mayoralty, has served as alderman, chairman of the board of school trustees, president of the Board of Trade and Fair Board.

### LIVED HERE MANY YEARS

Death Removes J. C. McLennan, Pioneer of Prince Rupert and British Columbia

John Charles McLennan, one of Prince Rupert's best known and most highly esteemed pioneer residents, passed away at 8:45 this morning at his residence on Borden Street after an illness of two years. The late Mr. McLennan was born in Milverton, Ont., January 13, 72 years ago and came to British Columbia in 1884. After teaching school in the Fraser Valley in the early days, he and R. L. Reid K.C., now of Vancouver, attended law school at the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor and practised as partners in law in Fair Haven, Wash. After living in the Kootenays for some time, Mr. McLennan moved to Portland, Ore., before coming to Prince Rupert in 1908 as liquidator for the sawmill of the B. C. T. & Timber Co. He was the first city assessor and served as a member of the hospital and school boards as well as an alderman. He was the second master of Tye Lodge A.F. & A.M., No. 66, having been a member of the Masonic order since the age of 21. He was also a member of Commandery Chapter of the Shrine. What Will be Done if Reich Decides to Go Ahead With Armament Plan?—France and Russia Negotiate Alliance

BERLIN, April 20:—It is stated in official quarters here that Reichsfuehrer Adolf Hitler is preparing to send to the League of Nations, following its adoption of a resolution rebuking Germany for violation of the military clauses of the Versailles Treaty, a reply "which will leave nothing to be desired in the way of plain language." The note is expected to go forward today or Sunday. Incidentally, it is Hitler's forty-sixth birthday today. Speculation now prevails as to whether the League will sanction a resort to arms if Germany should persist in its determination to re-arm in defiance of the Treaty of Versailles.

France and Russia are reported to be going ahead with a new defence treaty. L. McLennan, local barrister. Mr. McLennan is survived by brothers and sisters in the east. The funeral will take place from St. Andrew's Anglican Cathedral on Monday afternoon with the B. C. Undertakers in charge of arrangements. ## ARBITRATION IS ASKED BY FISHERMEN

Meeting Held Yesterday at Which It Was Decided to Make Suggestion to Boat Owners

At a general meeting of union fishermen yesterday afternoon Alex Duthie, the president, in the chair, it was decided to ask for arbitration in their dispute with the vessel owners over the sharing of the proceeds of the halibut livers. There was a large attendance.

The understanding is that, if it is agreed to arbitrate, the fishermen will go on the boats at once leaving the settlement to be dealt with by the arbitration board. The boat owners, many of whom are at present out fishing, have not yet given their answer.

The strike has already resulted in much loss to all concerned and it seems to be the general opinion in the city that an early settlement is much to be desired.
