WAR CLOUDS HANGING LOW AGAIN

Possibility of Oil Embargo Precipitating Conflict Of Major Proportions Discussed

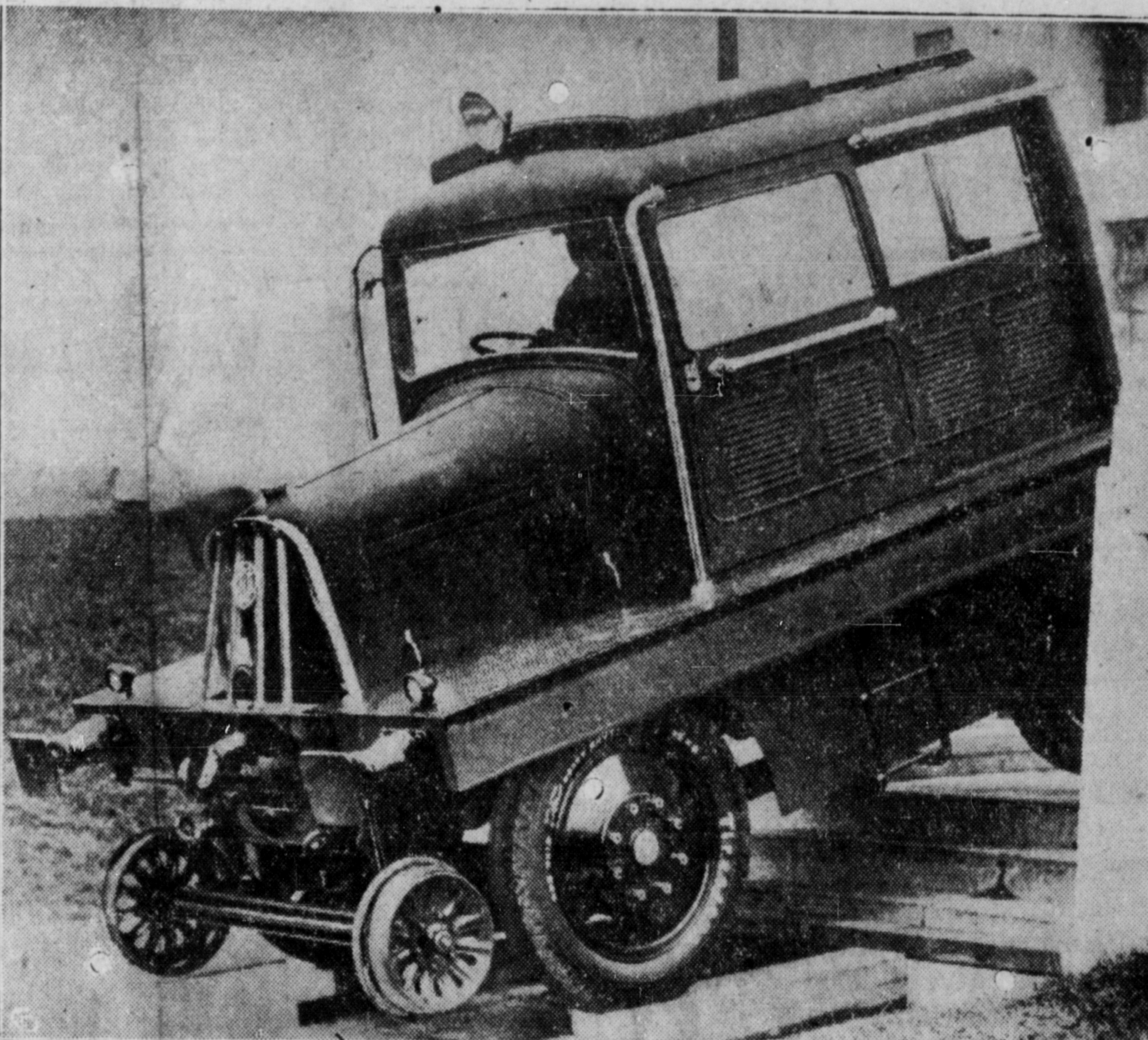

BRITISH WARNING TO JAPAN

Tokyo Apparently Intends To Enforce Its Will—Big Arms Appropriation Passes

PEIPING, Nov. 30: (CP)—An ultimatum demanding declaration of autonomy in North China was handed Chinese authorities today by representatives of the Imperial Kwantung Army, it was reliably reported.

Arrival of a trainload of tanks and an additional ten troop trains in Tientsin seemed to indicate there was every intention to back the ultimatum with force and that the Japanese appeared determined not to permit this demand to pass without definite action as did the last deadline for autonomy fixed for November 20.

London's Attitude

LONDON, Nov. 30:—In a note to Tokyo yesterday, the British government indicated that it did not like Japanese activities in North China. The note curtly reminded Japan that there was still such a thing as the nine-power treaty guaranteeing independence and boundaries of China.

Big Arms Appropriation

TOKYO, Nov. 30: (CP)—The Japanese Army and Navy won cabinet approval today for their greatest budget appropriations in the Empire's history when about \$659,000,000 was voted, almost forty-seven percent of which went to the army and navy. There was sharp opposition to the big military appropriation but it was overridden.

PACT WITH AUSTRALIA

Will Benefit B. C. Paper Exporters, Also Manufacturers Of Boots And Shoes

OTTAWA, Nov. 30:—A new trade treaty, which is in process of being drawn up with Australia, will benefit British Columbia exporters of wrapping paper and Eastern manufacturers of boots and shoes, it is intimated here.

Vancouver Wheat

VANCOUVER, Nov. 30: (CP)—Wheat closed at 86 1/2c on the local exchange yesterday, dropping to 85 3/4c today.

ONE SHIP IS LOADED

Longshoremen's Union Permits Luckenbach Vessel To Be Loaded After New Crew Is Signed On

SAN PEDRO, Nov. 30:—An alleged "unfair" crew from Mobile having been discharged and sent back to the Atlantic Coast, one of the Luckenbach line steamers sailed yesterday with a new crew after being loaded by union longshoremen.

The Luckenbach line has apparently surrendered to the International Longshoremen's Association in connection with the Gulf ports "hot cargo" strike and it is possible that two other of the company's ships, which have been held up for some time, may be loaded.

However, there is still some uncertainty as to whether or not the latest development implies a complete settlement of the longshoremen's strike which has been continuing to become general.

CLIPPER TO MAKE MACAO

Portuguese Port To Be Trans-Pacific Air Mail Base—Contracts Awarded

LONDON, Nov. 30:—The Portuguese government has awarded trans-Pacific air mail carrying contracts to the Pan-American Airways, operating between California and the Philippine Islands, it was announced yesterday.

The Portuguese port of Macao will, it is understood, be made the Chinese port of call for the Pan-American Airways, being chosen instead of Chinese ports owing to the strife in that country.

The China Clipper, before long will start making calls there.

SEARCH IS CONTINUED

Two Expeditions in Siamese Mountains to Check Up on Crash Reports

SINGAPORE, Nov. 30: (CP)—Two expeditions have left Siam, to investigate reports that Sir Charles Kingsford-Smith's plane, missing for over three weeks between Allahabad and Singapore in the course of a flight from England to Australia, crashed into the Siamese mountains, it is reported here. The result of the search into the wild territory may not be known for four days.

Pioneer Churchman Of Vancouver Dies

Rev. Dr. E. D. McLaren Passes Away In Military Hospital at Age Of Eighty-Five Years

VANCOUVER, Nov. 30: (CP)—Rev. Dr. E. D. McLaren, pioneer British Columbia churchman, died last night in Shaughnessy Military Hospital where he had been chaplain in recent years. Aged 85, he was born in Lanark, Ont., and was formerly minister of old St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church. He had been ill for some time and death was not unexpected.

CREW OF HALIBUT BOAT ITHONA HAD CLOSE CALL AFTER THEIR BOAT SANK

Well Known American Halibut Vessel Foundered After Striking Reef and Six Men Perched For Day On Storm-Swept Rock

KETCHIKAN, Nov. 30: (CP)—Capt. Ole Moland and five members of the crew of the halibut boat Ithona clung to a wave-swept rock for twenty-one hours after the Ithona struck a reef and sank in a gale on Tuesday night of this week, it was learned yesterday. The men were brought here on the halibutter Electra.
