WATERFRONT WHIFFS

Halibut Landings Continue Light With Only Larger Boats Fishing—Visit of International Fisheries Commission Next Week

With only the larger vessels of either the Canadian or American fleets still in operation on Area No. 3 grounds, the last week of November has seen only a comparatively small movement of halibut into Prince Rupert. Last year at this time, the season had ended and all the boats were long since tied up. This year fishing continues until Christmas Eve. During the past week landings at Prince Rupert totalled but 216,500 pounds of which 158,000 pounds was from American boats and 58,500 pounds from Canadian. The total for the season has reached 11,336,150 pounds consisting of 6,117,000 pounds American and 5,218,850 pounds Canadian fish. Boats landing catches during the week were as follows:

Canadian—Capella, 24,000 pounds, 7.7c and 6c; Johanna, 5,000, 7.4c and 6c; Melville, 20,000, 7.9c and 6c; Southend, 9,500, 7.4c and 5c.

American—Arctic, 34,000 pounds, 8c and 6c; Middleton, 24,000, 9c and 6c; Oceanic, 13,000, 8.5c and 6c; Restitution, 19,000, 8.6c and 6c; Sitka, 28,000, 9.6c and 6c; Grant, 40,000, 8c and 6c.

The full International Fisheries Commission consisting of Dr. J. Babcock, chairman; Dr. W. A. Found of Ottawa; F. T. Bell, United States Commissioner of Fisheries, and Edward W. Allen of Seattle will visit Prince Rupert on Wednesday and Thursday of next week, holding a public hearing on the latter day in order to receive local views as to possible alterations in the halibut fishing regulations. The Commission will be accompanied by Dr. Will F. Thompson, director of scientific investigations. The party will arrive Wednesday morning aboard the steamer Prince George from the south and will sail the next night on its return to Vancouver. To discuss possible matters to bring before the commission, the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union held a general meeting Thursday night and tomorrow the Canadian Halibut Vessel Owners' Association will hold a meeting for the same purpose. It is possible that a joint memorandum may be presented Dr. Found, it is expected, will address the Prince Rupert Gyro Club at luncheon on Wednesday.

The Seattle halibut boat Ithona, Capt. Ole Moland, the sinking of which in Alaska waters after striking a reef together with the narrow escape of her crew is described in a Canadian Press dispatch on the front page today, is well known in Prince Rupert although she had not been in this port during the past season. The Ithona was a twenty-ton vessel.

Coastwise Steamship & Barge Co.'s freighter Griffco, Capt. William Ross, was in port last night with a parcel of local cargo. She arrived from Tacoma and Vancouver and proceeded from here to Stewart.

On a regularly scheduled fortnightly voyage from Vancouver to Skagway, C. P. R. steamer Princess Norah, Capt. William Palmer, is due in port tomorrow morning about 8 or 9 o'clock.

Mrs. J. Drott and two children will sail on the Princess Norah tomorrow morning for Dawson.

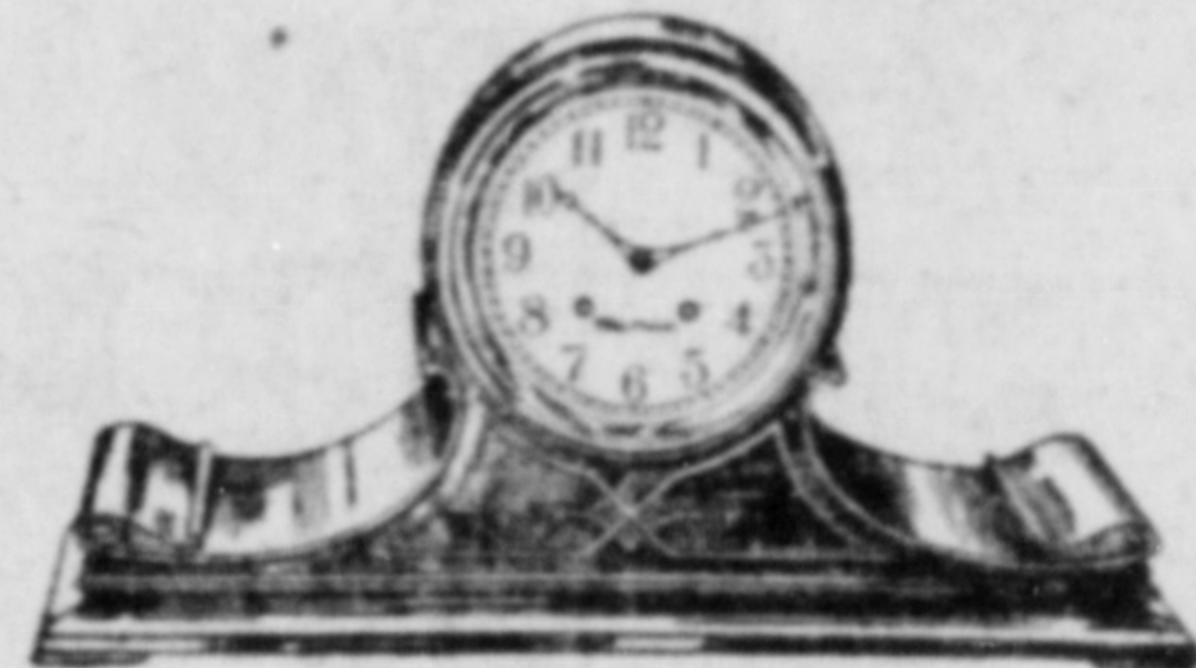
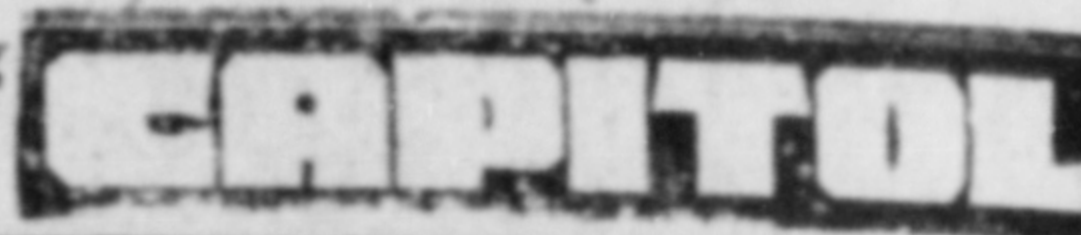
