SPORT CHAT

This has been a successful football season for United States coaches in the west and Canadian coaches in the east. It has been an even more successful year for American players in the west and Canadian players in the east. Prairie football seems to have reached a formative stage such as the other end of the country passed through two or three years ago.

Canadian coaches rose to the occasion to turn out teams that upset the well-drilled squads coached by Americans. It seemed just possible near the close of league hostilities that the influence of Uncle Sam may be greatly reduced by 1936. Having taught the Canadian to use the forward pass and improve his blocking in the line, he may be turned out. This is unlikely to be the case with such coaches as Lew Hayman of Toronto-Argonauts, Warren Stevens of University of Toronto, Art Massucci of Sarnia and Bill Storen of University of Western Ontario.

Among the coaches, the honors were bestowed upon Ted Reeve of Queen's, who brought the Tricolour its second intercollegiate title during his three years' stand at Kingston. Fred Veale's start with Hamilton Tigers, shaky at first, became an overwhelming success when the Tigers came from behind to capture the Big Four championship. These had little edge on other Canadians, including Alex Ponton of Balmly Beach, whose team made a brave stand against Sarnia in the O. R. F. U.; Joe O'Brien, noted referee who took over McGill and made the Redmen a great early-season threat, and the veteran Bill Hughes, who rallied Ottawa Roughriders near the finish so that the capital team twice defeated Argonauts.

Reeve's success with a big, willing, hard-hitting bunch of boys at Kingston was the more impressive because he started with a team that seemed destined for certain defeat from Toronto Varsity. It wasn't on the books that any college team would stop a Varsity

with Bobby Coulter, Joe Connelly, Hugh Marks, Cam Gray, Mike Valeriotte and Bob Isbister on the backfield. Yet Reeve accomplished it after first holding the Blues to a 3-3 tie and then losing an 18-15 decision. He proved at the start that Queen's was almost as good as this Toronto team, superbly coached by Warren Stevens, and he topped the Blues in a play-off.

Veale, former Queen's outside wing, had spent several years coaching Hamilton's second team, the Cubs of the O. R. F. U., before he was given his big chance with Tigers this fall. He started with an all-star cast, including Frank Turville and Huck Welch on the backfield, and spent a most uncomfortable month during which the Bengals behaved like anything but champions. They dropped two of their first four games, both to Argos, and then Johnny Ferraro, 1934 coach, came back as a player under Veale. Turville was injured but even that didn't matter. The combination of Veale, Welch and Ferraro was unbeatable in the Big Four.

One of the best forward pass instructors in the Canadian game, Bill Storen from Detroit, made a success with the Western Mustangs. The former St. Michael's College coach, helped by Johnny Metras, 1934 all-eastern snap, built the Mustangs from not much of anything into a team that could battle the East in the college union at the finish. He'll be back next season. Sarnia's Art Massucci, who led Imperials to the Canadian title in his first year, held together his great team through a series of injuries and is again shooting for national honors.

In the west, three exceptionally able coaching jobs were recorded. Bob Fritz, brought in from Concordia College, Minnesota, did everything that was expected of him by winning the western title for Winnipeg in his first year in the Canadian game. Al Ritchie, as able as any of them, turned out what he described his best Regina Roughrider team and saw it fight gamely but vainly against the powerful Manitobans. At Calgary, Carl Cronin built from the ground and produced a bang-up western finalist in November. Perhaps Cronin's feat was the most noteworthy. The former Notre Dame quarterback of Rockne's days helped Winnipeg to the Canadian final in 1933, then disappeared back into the United States for a year. Hamilton Tigers wanted him and Cronin almost went east, but he didn't. At Calgary he taught his Bronks real football. By next season he may present Alberta with a western title. This year's team was beaten only 7-0 by Winnipeg.
