Five Hundred Lives Lost As Result of Florida Hurricane Early Estimates Have Shown

MIAMI, Florida, September 4 (Canadian Press)— Loss of life in the Keys District following Monday's hurricane is estimated by the Red Cross at between four and five hundred, mostly in veterans' rehabilitation camps.

Aviators flew over the district, reporting houses twisted into piles of matchwood and boats piled up on land, cracked and twisted.

Veterans' camps were completely wiped out.
