NEW YORK, Nov. 6:-Supporters of the Roosevelt administration and the New Deal derived little comfort out of the elections in various states yesterday, the trend of which was definitely in the direction of Republicanism. The Republicans gained control of the State Assembly of New York, early results showed. The Republicans had made an issue of the New Deal and now predict a Republican majority in the presidential contest next year but the Democrats insist that the contest had been fought entirely on state issues and could not be regarded as significant nationally. In New Jersey Governor Hoffman retained his Republican majority.
