HIS PASSING IS MOURNED

All Metlakatla Attends Funeral Rites of Envoy Clifton

METLAKATLA, Feb. 22.—The entire population of the village of Metlakatla assembled at the impressive funeral rites on Tuesday afternoon to pay their final tributes of esteem and respect to the late Envoy George Herbert Clifton, head of the Salvation Army corps here and one of the village's most highly esteemed chiefs and leaders. Adjutant Eva Laycock of Prince Rupert conducted the service and Peter Haldane, lay reader, was in the chair, several other village leaders as well as visitors participating in the obsequies, arrangements for which were made by the Young Men's Benevolent Association. The funeral program was arranged by the Women's Auxiliary. Opening hymn and prayer was by Capt. William Leighton of the Church Army. Mrs. Peter Venn, president of the Women's Auxiliary, voiced the regret of that organization at Envoy Clifton's passing. Joseph Offut of Port Simpson conveyed the sympathy and condolences of that village. Sam Bennett, representing the United Church at Port Simpson, also spoke, expressing the hope that a successor fitting to follow deceased might be found. Chief Councillor William Leask spoke on behalf of the village of Metlakatla, paying tribute to the memory of deceased and expressing appreciation for numerous tokens of sympathy. Members of the Young Men's Benevolent Association sang four favorite hymns which were announced by Peter Leighton. Major Henry Prevost, Salvation Army, gave the closing prayer.

CAMPAIGN OF EVANGELIZING

Meeting to be Held Here Will Be Similar to Montreal Gathering

After months of careful planning, a joint committee of the Protestant Churches in Canada has recommended a definite campaign for the evangelization of Canadian life in all centres and areas across the Dominion.

Montreal has given the impetus to the program. Twenty thousand people gathered in the great Forum on January 14. A massed choir of two thousand voices and three hundred ministers were assembled on the platform. The Bishop of Montreal gave an address on "Witnessing for Christ," and the great audience was deeply impressed.

A similar service of Witness has been planned for Prince Rupert on Wednesday, March 6 in the Capitol Theatre. The proceedings, though adapted to meet local needs, will follow the identical lines of the great service in Montreal.
