WANTS WORK AND WAGES

After carefully explaining that it was not advocating the Pattullo policy which it has so often ridiculed, the Vancouver Province in an editorial article on Thursday last endorsed the policy to which it formerly objected. Instead of asking to have work provided through the national credit it puts it up to Mr. Bennett to provide the ways and means of financing. The Province says:

"We are asking Mr. Bennett very seriously to consider whether there is not, within the limits of honest statesmanship, the possibility of a real program of work and wages for the immediate benefit of the people of Canada.

"Why is it not possible to do something better about those thousands of young men in the relief camps than to keep them there, at a cost to the country of \$45 each a month?

"Why should it be found impossible to put them to work

and to put them in the way of wages?

"We do not mean that work should be made just for the sake of making work. We do not mean that wages should s be paid for anything in the nature of digging a hole and P then filling it again. But we mean that the credit of Canada must still be good for the purposes of some large scheme of public works which would be at once a permanent investment in the development of Canada as a going concern, and would confer the inestimable boon of work Chicago and wages upon men who are now eating their bread in New York enforced idleness.

"One such project, at least, comes to mind. We put it to Detroit Mr. Bennett that he should seize his opportunity and Boston commit his government to the immediate construction of Philadelphia a Canadian highway—a first-class road from shore to St. Louis shore of the Atlantic and Pacific. We believe he could mobilize the public opinion of Canada behind that idea. We believe it would stir the imagination of the Canadian people.
