Sulphuric Acid Causes Painful Burns For Boy

James Feasby, 12-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Feasby, 323 Beulah Avenue East, was able to return to his studies at Booth Memorial School yesterday but may carry scars for some considerable time as a result of a painful accident on Victoria Day. The lad was at Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve headquarters awaiting the line-up of the parade of Sea Cadets, of which he is a member, when a bottle of sulphuric acid was discovered. For some reason, the cork blew out and the contents flew on to his face, neck, ears and side of the head, inflicting painful burns. The boy was given first aid by Petty Officer Instructor Ross before being taken to the Prince Rupert General Hospital for further dressing. He was able to return to his home in a few hours.

WHIFFLETS
From the Waterfront
Trout Fishing Fine at Khtada—Northland Brings Five Cars of Fish—Mae West Had Close Call.
Except for the fact that the fish may be a little on the thin side, angling conditions are reported to be of the best just now at Khtada Lake by a party consisting of R. G. Van der Sluys, F. A. MacCallum, E. J. Clapp, Johnny Pierce, Foster Willan, Sid Dickens and Wlizer Bryant which visited there over the week-end, making the trip on Skipper Van der Sluys' Aussie. They left Saturday noon and returned Sunday night with a catch of some eight dozen or so fine fish. The trail is in excellent condition, unusually dry and with no snow. The boats which were put on the lake a year ago are in good shape. Water in the lake is low owing to the recent dry spell. Another party including Malcolm Lamb and Pete McCormick also visited Khtada at the end of the week, going in Friday night and coming out Sunday morning, and had good fishing. Northland Transportation Co.'s motorship liner Northland, Capt. Len Williams, arrived in port at 10 o'clock last night from Ketchikan and, after discharging four carloads of fresh halibut and one carload of mild cured salmon for transshipment east over Canadian National Railways, sailed at 3 a.m. in continuation of her voyage to Seattle.

icates that the recent experience of the well known Seattle halibut boat Albatross in being lashed by a giant combur which almost swept her clean above decks was a real narrow escape for both vessel and crew. Only the fact that her crew of ten men were below decks saved them from being washed overboard, it is declared. As it was extensive damage was done and it was all the crippled vessel could do to limp into Ketchikan for repairs at the end of the week.

Captain Red Pierce and his crew aboard the local halibutter Mae West got a bad scare and a ducking about a week ago. They were crossing Wright Sound light and, as it looked likely to be foggy, all except the man at the helm had turned in for the night to try to get some sleep. Then a sudden squall struck the vessel turning her right over and very soon the crew was holding on to the keel. Happily the skipper had the presence of mind to cut the dory loose. The Mae West was righted and arrived home about the middle of last week, leaving again for the halibut banks on Friday. The decks were swept of gear.

All is quiet at the local elevator following the departure last week of the British steamer Fresno City with a full cargo for the United Kingdom or Continent. Only a small amount of wheat is left in the house and none is on the way. There will likely be little doing at the elevator now for a month or so pending decision as to the future of the plant following expiry of the Alberta Wheat Pool's lease this summer.
