

GRAHAM ISLAND IS RICH IN SALMON AND HALIBUT

Daily News Correspondent is Impressed With the Great Possibilities of the Fishing Industry—Fishing Grounds Are the Best in the World

(Special Correspondence)

Masset.—The fishing grounds next engaged our attention. At Langara Island swarms of sea gulls were following the herring, and we passed the spring salmon fishing grounds of the Masset Indians. It is not generally known that these Indians caught over three thousand spring salmon during the spring fishing, off Langara Island, and the season only lasted for forty days. The average catch, with a "line and spoon," numbered ten for each Indian, daily; they received seventy cents per fish, and some of them weighed over seventy pounds—one weighed ninety-two pounds.

In Hecate Straits, where the salmon fishing is carried on, and where we passed the herring banks, the halibut grounds which are world famous, exist. The Indians capture them by hundreds, bringing them to their village and drying them for winter use. Some of the fish weigh two hundred pounds. It is no uncommon sight to see an American trawler, in the waters of Hecate Straits, with boats out and gathering halibut in large numbers.

The fishing grounds in the neighborhood of Langara Island and Masset Inlet are the best in the

known world. At the present time the duty on halibut, entering the United States, is one cent per pound, which is more than the Indians receive for the fish in the local market.

At the various small rivers along the Inlet several species of salmon have their spawning beds. The sockeye, coho, steelhead, humpback and dog salmon ascend Masset Inlet and are caught at the mouth of the streams. There is fine coho fishing, off the entrance, to the Inlet, where one can make a remarkable showing in a day; one boy caught twenty-eight cohoes, in five hours with a line and spoon.

The game birds on Graham Island, are limited to ducks and geese. During the month of October, the birds return from the north, and good shooting will be indulged in. The animal kingdom has few of the species on the island. A few deer were introduced recently.

Black bear, martin and land otter are the only animals roaming inland. The absence of wolves, panther and other wild animals is a blessing and the cattle are not troubled. A party of surveyors shot ten wild cattle last year and a number of the animals live near Cape Fife.

NEW METHODIST CHURCH BLDG.

Mr. Emil Kauffman Will Attend to the Work Which Will Cost About \$18,000. Fine Building, Finely Fitted is Planned.

Contracts for the new Methodist Church will all be handled by Emil Kauffman, the contractor who built the big warehouses at the wharf. The total cost of the building will be \$18,000 or over. In every way the church will be worthy of Prince Rupert. It is to be a good building both externally, and as regards its interior fittings. Built towards the back of the church lots, the edifices will leave space to the front which may be used later for an extension of the frontage to make a much larger building. G. L. Proctor is architect.

Amongst the interior fittings, the fine organ, one of the best obtainable down below is noticeable. Seating will be very comfortable and heating arrangements are to be by the newest system of all, known as the Srane System which heats each row of seats directly and speedily by steam. Messrs. Smith & Mallet will put in this plant.

Accommodation for Sunday school, and for young men's and young women's classes will be in the basement commodious and modern. There will be a hall for socials, and parlors such as the fine churches in the East feature so acceptably. Altogether the Methodists are going to have a good building to meet the needs of a growing community. The meeting to decide the award of contracts, etc., was held in Mr. Manson (the Mayor's) office, not the offices of Messrs. Williams & Manson. The slip in last night's News was one of Mac's famous breaks. Of course as everybody knows Mr. Manson, the Mayor, is a leading light of the Methodist Church in Prince Rupert, while Mr. Alex Manson is a pillar of the Presbyterian Church.

ALDERMANIC AMENITIES

Ald. Clayton Twits Ald. Douglas on His Years. Douglas on His Dignity, Replies Sharply.

Over the matter of the I. W. W. protest against what they term "chain gang" labor on the Recreation Park Alderman Douglas and Alderman Clayton were opposed on Monday and exchanged compliments. Alderman Douglas had stated that his working men supporters were protesting against the prison labor. Alderman Clayton said: "Of course I don't represent such a number of working men as does Alderman Douglas."

"No, and you never will," said Douglas. (Laughter.)
"But," went on Alderman Clayton, "many of my supporters have expressed themselves in favor of the prison labor system." The alderman went on to refer slightly to Alderman Douglas's age, saying that while the old man could not be accused of one kind of childishness, he was in his second childhood which came to the same thing.

Alderman Douglas was clearly on his dignity and replied with some asperity: "I may be older than Alderman Clayton, and have had more experience of the public mind than he has. That may be why I don't have to harg on to the tail of a political party to get elected. The public returned me for myself."

"Yes, you got thirteen votes," said Alderman Clayton.
"I stand alone, independent of party," added the redoubtable Douglas in conclusion, "and I have the support of the public whose interests I am here to protect." (Applause from the back seats.)
