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FIFTH LIFE IS CLAIMED

Time Does Not Pay, is Shown As Result of Vancouver Bank Hold-Up

VANCOUVER, Nov. 28: (CP)—The hanging of Earl Dunbar at the gallows yesterday made the fifth to die as a result of the armed hold-up of a Vancouver branch of the Canadian Bank of Commerce last winter when William Hobbs, teller, was fatally shot. Charles Russell was hanged November 6 and two other accomplices suicided as they were about to be arrested after Hobbs had died.

WELCOME IS EXTENDED

Representative Citizens Take Part In Reception to Commissioner and Mrs. John McMillan

With representative clergy and citizenry attending and taking part, a civic welcome meeting for Commissioner John McMillan of Toronto, head of the Salvation Army for Canada, Newfoundland, Bermuda and Alaska, and Mrs. McMillan, who are paying their first visit to Prince Rupert, was held last night in the local Citadel. The meeting was conducted by Brigadier W. J. Carruthers of Wrangell, divisional commander for Northern British Columbia and Alaska, and City Commissioner W. J. Alder occupied the chair. Assisting the City Commissioner in extending the civic welcome were Ex-Mayor M. M. Stephens and Dr. Joseph T. Mandy, both of whom spoke briefly. Very Rev. James B. Gibson, dean of St. Andrew's Cathedral, spoke for the Prince Rupert Ministerial Association. The address of the evening was, of course, that of Commissioner McMillan. Mrs. McMillan was also heard from. Mrs. Halvorsen of Hazelton read from the Scripture and Adjutant Eva Laycock, local commandant, made the announcements. There was a duet by Adjutant Laycock and her assistant, Capt. E. Robertson, W. Vaughan Davies was pianist for the evening. Rev. C. D. Clarke, pastor of First United Church, pronounced the benediction. Rev. Dr. F. W. Dafee, pastor of First Baptist Church, said the opening prayer. Commissioner McMillan, in his address, paid tribute to Adjutant Eva Laycock, the local commandant. It was gratifying to hear that her work here was appreciated. Prince Rupert had two "saints of God" in the persons of the local officers. Their unselfish and self-sacrificing work was typical of that of all Army officers. Commissioner McMillan referred to the progress that had been made in the fifty years that the Army had been active in Canada. He discussed some of the problems which faced the Army in its diversified activities and related some inspiring and touching anecdotes. He appealed to his listeners not to yield to the subtle temptations of the age, not to be lost in the crowd but to deny themselves in following and serving the Lord. It was no easy thing to come to the mercy seat in these days, to wear the badge of Christ's service, but, nevertheless, more people than ever were now doing this. Mrs. McMillan was appreciative of the warmth of the kindly reception which they had been accorded in Prince Rupert which she considered a most beautiful spot. She, too, related some interesting incidents and anecdotes of long years of Army service. City Commissioner Alder deemed it a privilege to welcome Commissioner and Mrs. McMillan. He acknowledged with gratitude the work the Army was doing in Prince Rupert and its assistance to the city. M. M. Stephens declared that money could not pay for the valuable work the Army carried out. It went to the spot where it was needed. He spoke from the heart when he paid tribute to the Army. Dr. Mandy asserted that there were few, if any, who were not influenced in some way by the work of the Army. He recalled meeting General William Booth and General Higgins both of whom had impressed him greatly. Dean Gibson, as representative of the Prince Rupert Ministerial Association, added his tribute to the work of the Army and its officers. They were entitled to every support. Brigadier Carruthers referred to the many warm-hearted supporters the Army had in Prince Rupert including the city commissioner.

STRIKE NEAR SETTLED

NEW YORK—Barney Ross of Chicago, 143½ pounds, retained the world's welterweight title last night, defeating Izzy Jannazzo, 145½ pounds, New York Italian, in fifteen rounds. Ross was given ten rounds and Jannazzo four with one even.

LOYALISTS WINNING

MADRID—Madrid's defence unit today announced that its troops had routed an insurgent army which attacked Pozuela de Alaron in an attempt to cut off the northwestern road. It is also asserted that an international battalion on the southern front line drove back the insurgents several miles.

ITALY-JAPAN ACCORD

ROME—An accord between Italy and Japan for mutual recognition of the Japanese-sponsored Manchukuo state and Italian Ethiopia has been reached, officials state. The accord is understood to include several commercial clauses.

Things Are Looking Much More Serious in Far East—Reinforcements Being Rushed by Both Sides—Khabarovsk Danger Spot.

MOSCOW, Nov. 28: (CP)—Reports of heavy losses in a pitched battle between Russian and Japanese border patrols in the Far East threaten a new crisis in the Soviet's strained relations with Japan. The Soviet government has rejected a Japanese protest over a border incident on Tuesday and has lodged her own over the latest clash. Officials are reported to have ordered Russian patrols strengthened at all outposts. Both nations are said to be rushing reinforcements to a remote danger point at Khabarovsk. Authorities in Moscow express suspicion that the Japanese are attempting to provoke a sizeable incident to test the power of the Red Army.
