

Pay Section of Local Library Proving Successful

"One point of interest is the growth of the Pay Section, which has now become a workable unit in the library," said the annual report of the librarian for 1935 presented at the monthly board meeting last; night. "This section has not only increased but is self-supporting. The circulation, 915 in 1934, increase to 2,850 in 1935. Books are bought regularly each month and many of the latest books are on order even before publication. Not | only is this section a convenience to many of the borrowers but it is an asset to the main part of the library since there is a steady influx of books from this section to the public shelves. The Pay Section is distinct from the other part of the library in that it is financially independent. Money given for new books is not spent on this section. "What type of books are in great-

for renewing the subscriptions to the magazines in the reading room. The demand for new reading ma-

terial, both for pleasure and of a practical nature, is much greater than the library can at present fill. This is particularly true of the non-fiction part of the library. More new books are needed for those who wish up-to-date material on subjects of scientific and practical value.
