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BRITAIN IN FAVOR OF DEMOCRACY

FINE TALK ABOUT VIMY

Norman Watt Graphically Describes Ceremony Which He Witnessed With Others

Touching Scenes

Sun Suddenly Burst From Among Clouds as King Began to Speak to Assemblage

An intensely interesting address on the Vimy Pilgrimage was given yesterday afternoon before the Prince Rupert Rotary Club by Norman Watt, who was present in person and gave an eye-witness report of the proceedings. After mentioning in some detail the landings in France and the trip to Vimy by bus Mr. Watt continued:

"The guard of honor was drawn up at the rear of the memorial. It consisted of 200 bluejackets from H. M. S. Saguenay, 100 Canadian pilgrims, 100 French soldiers in full uniform and approximately 100 Spahis or Moroccan troopers. These troopers were mounted on grey and brown Arab horses and divided into two sections. Their long, flowing white capes, scarlet tunics, blue trousers, khaki caps and unsheathed swords lent a color to the spectacle that is difficult to describe. Present also were the Canadian pipers and a band of the Royal Canadian Horse Artillery. Some half dozen or more members of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police occupied prominent positions on the monument itself. At the immediate front stood a number of standard bearers made up of members from the British Legion and French veterans. These representatives were present to do honor to the Canadian dead and also the large number of their compatriots who had died in the previous battles at Vimy. Along the face of the monument stood a contingent of some 200 ex-nursing sisters, each wearing a khaki beret indicative of war service. To their immediate left were 24 blind Canadian pilgrims and a colored Canadian soldier named "Curley" Christian immediately back of the Canadian nurses were the Canadian pilgrims drawn up in company formation of two ranks each numbering consecutively from one to ten. Back of the Canadian pilgrims was a contingent of some 50 blind veterans of the French Army. Next came the French Legionnaires numbering approximately 300. On the left of these groups were the relatives of French soldiers and on the right, the relatives of the Canadian soldiers. Around the whole was thrown a cordon of French infantry dressed in their great coats and steel helmets and outside of this cordon was the general public.

Major W. E. Gladstone Murray Gets \$14,000 per Year as General Manager of Radio

OTTAWA, Sept. 25:—Appointment of Major William Ewart Gladstone Murray of the British Broadcasting Commission as general manager of the Canadian Radio Broadcasting Commission and Major Murray's acceptance of the appointment are officially announced. Major Murray had been recommended by the newly created Radio Commission. Dr. Augustin Frigon, French-Canadian chairman of the Quebec Utility Commission, has accepted appointment as assistant general manager. Major Murray's salary will be \$14,000 per year and Mr. Frigon's \$12,000.
