### THE KING, GOD BLESS HIM

Many people in Prince Rupert yesterday were thanking God that King Edward was safe from the hands of a possible assassin. It is surprising what a grip the King has on the hearts of many of his people in Canada. They look on him almost as a personal friend. Some have seen him and some have not but all are agreed that if anything happened to him it would be a national calamity.

### IS CANADA A NATION?

It is difficult for Canada to speak of herself as a nation. She is rather a group of people with many conflicting national ideas living in the same country. There is not that patriotic love of country which inspires a real nation. There are too many French-Canadians, English, Scotch or Irish Canadians, German Canadians, Italian Canadians, Greek Canadians and dozens of other kinds of Canadians to form anything like a real patriotic unit. Two generations from now most of the population of Canada will be native born and may be expected to form the nucleus of a nation.

Compare Canada with Japan for a moment. In that country practically every man is native born and he is so imbued with the greatness of his country and with its wonderful future that he is willing to sacrifice his life at any time in its interest. Japanese go to war with a fanatical fervor, believing that if they die in defence of their country and her honor they are expressing themselves in the noblest manner possible. They are really patriotic.

To hear young Japanese men sing their national songs is sufficient to convince that they really have faith in the future of their country and in its greatness. There is nobody in that country who suggests that Russia is a better country than their's or that any other system of government is superior to their's. To them Japan is the greatest of all nations and they are ready and willing to fight for her at all times, regardless of the justice of their cause. Such a nation as that is hard to beat in war and competition with them in peace is also difficult. Before Canada can become a great nation she must cultivate at least some of the spirit which makes other nations great.

England Takes Team Trophy to  
Hales—Six Canadians In Final  
For King's Prize

Now One and a Half Games Ahead  
of St. Louis Cardinals in  
National League

**NEW YORK**, July 17.—(CP)—New York Yankees defeated the world champion Detroit Tigers at Bennett yesterday and the Tigers dropped from second into third place below the Cleveland Indians who shut out the Philadelphia Athletics at Shibe Park. The lead of the Yankees is now nine and a half games over the Indians and ten games over the Tigers. The Boston Red Sox and St. Louis Browns split a double-header at Boston, the Red Sox going into fourth place ahead of the Washington Senators who, playing at home, lost to the Chicago White Sox.

The Chicago Cubs needed but one win to defeat the Boston Braves at Wrigley Field and increased their National League lead to one and a half games over St. Louis Cardinals who were losing to the Phillies at Sportsmen's Field. Eight pitchers were used in the game in which New York Giants beat Pittsburgh Pirates 7 to 4.
