SITE FOR POST OFFICE

The question of site seems to have been one of the stumbling blocks to the erection of a building in the past.

ODIOUS COMPARISONS

Making some comparisons between Canada and Great Britain, Bruce Hutchison in the Victoria Times writes: "Here in Canada, where we sometimes look on the Old Country as behind the times, we find that a non-elective Senate, manned by political has-beens, broken-downs and never-were's, is stultifying the newly-elected House of Commons. Mr. Meighen, defeated every time he led a government to the country, is leading the Senate now and telling the Canadian people what legislation they can have and what they can't. No noble lord could get away with that in Britain for twenty-four hours. Over there no noble lord would have the effrontery to try.

"This is one reason why we shouldn't laugh at poor blundering Baldwin. Another reason is that this country has no right to laugh at a British government which was afraid to fight Mussolini for fear of starting a conflagration when obviously we Canadians were not prepared to fight either. We were not prepared to propose oil sanctions, even. We had enough sense to keep out of the mess. But to smirk now at a government which felt the same way as we did is rather obscene."

CARDINALS STILL LEAD BAMBINO AS PILOT

Half Game Margin Over Chicago Who Won Double-Header Yesterday

CHICAGO, July 10: (CP)—Chicago Cubs took both ends of a double-header by close scores from Brooklyn Dodgers here yesterday, the first game being a 13-inning battle, but the rough and tumble St. Louis Cardinals held the National League leadership by a margin of half a game by winning over the New York Giants at Sportsmen's Field.

In the American League, Wes Ferrell pitched his twelfth win of the season for the Boston Red Sox who defeated the Chicago White Sox at Boston. The Red Sox, who had a disastrous losing streak recently, are now doing better on the home stand. The best Joe DeMaggio, sensational young rookie batsman, could do for the New York Yankees yesterday was to gather one single in four times at bat, the Yanks losing to the Cleveland Indians at the Yankee Stadium to have their margin of leadership reduced to eight and a half games over the Detroit Tigers who, even with Mickey Cochrane and Hank Greenberg off the line-up, defeated the Washington Senators in a free-hitting game at the National Capital for their thirteenth win in the last fifteen starts.
