ARE FISHING Spanish Rebels Are Warned To

Seventy Rivers Inlet Boats Take Advantage of Protection-Strikers to Meet Michaud

VICTORIA, July 23: (CP)-Reports from Rivers Inlet reaching here yesterday said that seventy boats had taken advantage of the offer of the provincial minister of labor, Hon. George S. Pear- + son, that, since the strikers had . lerrace refused to arbitrate, fishermen who wished to continue operations could do so. Boats went out into Rivers Inlet to fish under police protection against picketers, reports said.

Advices today to provincial nearly one hundred boats were now fishing behind a line of police and packers' boats at Rivers Inlet. There was little picketing and only one boat was shouted in from the shore. All, indications are that the strike is probably over but eighty percent of the fishermen have left the district and Namu is the only cannery operating, all fish being sent there.

It is further stated that the strikers intend to present their case to Hon. J. E. Michaud, minister of labor from Ottawa, at a meeting on Saturday at Rivers Inlet in the course of Mr. Michaud's visit to the coast.

Earl Ovington, Who Flew First United States Air Mail, Succumbs

GLENDALE, Cal., July 23:-Earl Ovington, veteran aviator, who delivered the first air mail in the history of the United States, died here yesterday from a heart attack after a lengthy illness. In 1911 he took a sack of mail a distance of ten miles on Long Island in an open plane, dropping it to the ground when he was unable to make a landing. 
