Killed by Bullet Carried 20 Years

Missile Received in Heart During War Finally Fatal To Surrey Man

RIPLEY, Eng., Sept. 29: (CP)—After carrying a bullet in his heart for 20 years, John Makinson, hotel proprietor of Ripley, Surrey, died while he and his wife were on a Mediterranean cruise. The bullet had been shot into his heart at the Gallipoli landing during the war and remained there for the remainder of his life.

The object of Makinson's Mediterranean cruise was to show his wife the war zone in which he had fought. During the voyage home-ward the bullet moved and killed him. His widow brought his body back to England.
