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TEARING UP LINES

There has been some talk of tearing up the line of railway between Prince Rupert and Jasper in order to save money for the people of Canada.

If there is to be any tearing up of railway tracks, why not start on the line between Red Pass and Vancouver? It would be a great advantage to the Canadian Pacific Railway in that any traffic now going east by the national line direct might go by the C.P.R. Then the C.N.R. could centre its business at Prince Rupert, as was originally intended, and there would be no need for friction between the two lines. The route to and from Vancouver by way of Prince Rupert would also be featured and this would enable the C.N.R. to make this section of the line pay dividends. Also it would enable the C.N.R. to bring its general offices back to Prince Rupert where they belong. If the time and money spent on the railway between Red Pass and Vancouver were put on this section of the road, it would be kept in such shape that fast trains could run over it.

These people who at one time induced settlers to come north and then later speak of abandoning railways are a poor lot of sports. They are the type of people who make us restless of our Eastern Canadian connection and speak of the possibility of the west breaking away from the east and forming a separate Dominion where we might manage our own affairs and be much better off than we are today. To those sort of people homes and farms mean nothing. All they think about is money and more particularly money for themselves. They speak and think in the most heartless manner of tearing up railway lines in order to save money. Is it any wonder that people so treated should turn around and suggest that these plutocrats divide up their money with the rest of the people? One view is just as reasonable and kind and considerate as the other.

Indians Fit On Vegetable Diet

Touring Cricketers Decline Many Invitations to Big Banquets

LONDON, June 17: (CP)—Rien foods are not conducive to good play on the cricket field, officials of the touring Indian team believe. For this reason the visiting cricketers have declined dozens of invitations to luncheon and ceremonial dinners.

The team's program is a heavy one and there are a few idle days for the players whose tour does not conclude until mid-September. They rest as much as possible between matches. "It is our duty to keep the men fit for cricket and you cannot do that on rich foods," an official explained. "They are not undergoing any special diet but they naturally prefer Indian curries and foods."

During their stay in London the Indians are being served with menus which are predominantly "vegetable." The following is a specimen menu at the Grand Central Hotel where they stay when in the capital.

Breakfast—Fresh fruit, fried eggs and tomatoes and occasional vegetable curries.

Lunch—Vegetable soup, hors d'oeuvre, fish, vegetable cutlets or curried vegetables with new potatoes, apple flan or fruit salad, tea.

Dinner—Thick vegetable soup, curried fish with vegetables or roast lamb, ice pudding, coffee.
