## Unfair Criticism

There are several papers, not newspapers but organs, published in this country, that criticize everything. They seldom see good in anything that is done in this country by any one. They ridicule all those in authority—whether in the state, the church, in business or elsewhere. A lot of poor dupes pay for these publications, people who have been thus educated to be against everything.

While the greatest possible amount of freedom should undoubtedly be permitted, it is doubtful if a pernicious system of education such as that mentioned should be permitted. In Russia they found it impossible to build up a good citizenship under such conditions so they refused to allow it. Fruculent criticism of people holding high positions is not allowed. Short work is made of them no matter in what part of the country they may be found.

Why should Canada allow the offscourings of the earth to come here and raise ructions and try to educate the young of the country to a system that is objectionable to the rest of the people? As we have said they do not allow it in Russia. Also they do not allow it in Italy, Germany, Japan, Austria and many other of the most advanced countries.

The whole mentality of being against everything is subversive to progress. Faith in the good spells progress. More things are accomplished by faith than by anything else in the world. While there is no objection to any person believing anything that appeals to him, there is objection to the young being educated to become disturbers of the peace. The state professes to be in charge of education but there is the widest possible latitude given for anyone to teach anything he wishes to anyone he wishes.

## Government is a Party

The federal government is a party to this propaganda that is going on all the time by allowing the use of the mails at special rates to these papers which do not attempt to publish the news but only publish such distorted accounts as may suit them with most of the articles in the way of destructive comment, not news. The object of giving special rates to newspapers is to encourage them to disseminate news and not to continue a fusillade of propaganda against Canadian institutions and people who are trying to improve conditions. In this country freedom has in many cases degenerated into licence.

We are strong for democracy, but even in a democracy there should be some restrictions in regard to what is allowed to be published. Also there should be restrictions in regard to the kind of propaganda allowed to be taught the young.

New Yorkers Increase Margin Of Leadership in National Hockey League

NEW YORK, Dec. 30. (CP)—New York Rangers increased their margin of leadership in the American Section of the National Hockey League last night by winning an easy 5 to 1 victory over their fellow townsmen, the Americans, in New York. The Boston Bruins, playing at home, blanked the Montreal Maroons three to nil and went into a tie for second place in the American section with the Detroit Red Wings. At Chicago, the Black Hawks turned back the fast-moving Canadiens from Montreal by a score of 5 to 1. The Canadiens are still in first place in the International Section with a commanding lead over the Toronto Maple Leafs, New York Americans and Montreal Maroons, all of whom are tied for second position. Last night's National Hockey League scores: Maroons 0, Boston 3. Canadiens 1, Chicago 5. New York Rangers 5, New York Americans 1.

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
