## DRESS COSTS LOWER NOW

Further Reductions For French Clothes In Sight Survey Shows

PARIS, Jan. 16: (CP)—The price of Paris clothes will be reduced again in some dressmaking houses when 1936 spring fashions are launched, a survey of the fashion world shows. And women's economies are a prime factor in the situation.

The representative of one designer said the reductions in his house would probably amount to "about 10 percent of 1935 prices, though no definite figure can be stipulated until the collection is finished and its cost determined."

Representatives of several big dressmakers stated their houses were constantly working to lower prices of all models as much as possible without making a definite percentage reduction, though some declared they had already shaved prices "to bed rock" and could cut no more. All insist quality of material and workmanship must be maintained.

The reductions are in line with the battle which designers have waged for the last four years on business conditions produced by the world wide depression, the unsettled political situation and the fall of the dollar and pound. Since 1931 virtually every dressmaking house in Paris has reduced prices from 10 to 40 percent over those of four years ago.

Stock Market And Clothes  
Fluctuations on the stock market play a big role in influencing business in the dressmaking world, say some of its representatives.

"Our business has always moved in definite relation to the stock exchange," said one. "When stocks are up in the morning, our salons are full in the afternoon and when stocks are down they are virtually empty, for women realize that is no time to tell their husbands they have just bought several new frocks."

World wide economic conditions and the changing trend of the times are called other important features.

"Women don't spend what they once did on clothes," the manager of one dressmaking house said. "Everybody is making economies on everything and clothes meet reductions on their budgets with everything else. We have had to reduce prices. Fabric manufacturers have cut theirs and that, of course, has helped us, but fabrics are a relatively small part of the cost of a model. It is the overhead which counts."
