Operate Another Year In Waters of Siberia Time-Negotiations Had Been Held up by Anti-

No Promises, However, Made as to Future After That Communist Pact

MOSCOW, Dec. 23: (CP)-Japan has been given the right to continue fishing in Siberian waters for one year. Officials of the Soviet Foreign Office, which has been hesitating for some time, approved extension of the expiring agreement but made no promises for the future. Russia had previously agreed to an eight-year renewal but negotiations ended abruptly on November 9 when the Berlin-Tokvo nact against Communism was signed. Tokyo has been officially advised of the decision of the Soviet to extend the agreement.
