Remembrance Day Observed By Young People

With the president, Wilfred Hicks, in the chair, the denominational Young People's Society met last night in the social parlors of First United Church.

The meeting, which was largely of a Remembrance Day nature, was opened by a brief but inspiring devotional period in charge of the Misses Edith Connery and Joy Green. Miss Wheatley rendered the solo, "In Flander's Fields."

Following a reel of motion pictures shown by Rev. C. D. Clarke, Tom Johnstone took charge of the meeting. He gave a few appropriate introductory remarks on Remembrance Day and then introduced the three speakers, Miss Eileen Hamblin, Maurice Davey and Ken Harding, who gave short talks on peace and related subjects.

Dr. H. N. Brocklesby, of the staff of the Fisheries Experimental Station, was the main speaker for the evening, his topic being "The Philosophy of Science." In his usual interesting manner, the speaker presented a brief survey of the universe, of man, of the theory of evolution and of man's place in the universe, which provided much thought-provoking and instructive material for his audience.
