MARRIAGE OF KING IS HINTED AT

Restoration of Salary Cuts to be Effected In Lower Paid Positions

Surplus Shown in Budget For Year, According to Finance Minister John Hart in Legislature This Afternoon—Unemployment Relief Cost is Eleven Million Dollars For Year

VICTORIA, March 11: (CP)—British Columbia's revenues for the last three years have exceeded the amounts estimated and the expenditures have been below the appropriations, Hon. John Hart told the Legislature in his budget speech today. A steady but moderate improvement in all branches of industry have helped to bring the revenues above the totals estimated in his three budgets, Mr. Hart said. This improvement was greater than anticipated at the beginning of 1935 and would continue during the coming year, he forecast. No new taxes are called for in the budget. The gloomy cloud upsetting an otherwise bright financial picture, he said, was the cost of unemployment, the total bill for which in British Columbia last year was \$11,000,000, of which the province's share was over \$5,000,000 and the heavy burden of debt redemption charge. Announcements regarding the fiscal policies of refunding, taxation field rights as affecting the Dominion, the province and the municipalities and loan control were withheld pending consideration of the Ottawa Conference ruling.

CAPE BEALE WILL BE FIRST VESSEL OUT THIS SEASON

The Cape Beale, Capt. Edgar Arnott, will probably be the first vessel of the local halibut fleet to get away to the banks this year. She will leave tomorrow night or Friday morning to be on the westward banks when the fishing opens next Monday. The Lysekil, Capt. Al Wole, arrived last Sunday from Vancouver, where she spent the winter, and will leave for the grounds next Sunday.

Clearing of Debris in Skeena So Spawning Salmon May Pass Is Being Asked by Victoria

VICTORIA, March 11: (CP)—The fisheries committee of the Legislature yesterday adopted a recommendation that Ottawa be asked to clear the Skeena River of debris to enable salmon to reach the spawning grounds. E. T. Kenney, Liberal member for Skeena, told the members of the committee that the river was choked so badly that the fish were unable to proceed upstream and Dominion spawning hatcheries located on it would be useless unless the debris was cleared away. Mr. Kenney suggested that the unemployed be used for the work. G. J. Alexander, deputy minister of fisheries, said he had gone into the matter of fish net prices and had been told by net manufacturing agents that, if the cannery and fishermen got together and standardized nets, they would be much cheaper. U.S. PACT RATIFIED

All But Conservatives Support American-Canadian Trade Treaty at Ottawa

OTTAWA, March 11: (CP)—The Canadian-American trade treaty was ratified last night by the House of Commons, all but the straight Conservatives voting with the government. The division was 175 to 39. Although many provisions of the treaty became effective on January 1, including all the tariff changes, the agreement will not have the force of law until Parliament passes the necessary bill, possibly in another ten days.

NEW GOV'T IS FORMED

Premier Koki Hirota Succeeds In Forming Cabinet Which Is Hailed as Compromise

TOKYO, March 11:—Giving full representation to the army and navy although purporting to be a compromise administration between Liberals and militarists, Premier Koki Hirota, Japan's new Prime Minister, has succeeded in forming a new cabinet for presentation to Emperor Hirohito.

Building Workers' Strike Spreading

Grand Central Area in New York Now Affected by Walk-Out

NEW YORK, March 11:—The strike of building service workers has spread to the Grand Central area, a number of the city's important hotels becoming involved in the walk-out of janitors, elevator operators and other workers. From one to one and a half million of the city's population of seven million has now become affected by the strike.

BARCELONA, Spain, March 11:—Douglas Fairbanks and his bride, the former Lady Sylvia Ashley, have arrived here by airplane from Paris in the course of their honeymoon tour following their marriage at the end of the week. They will spend twelve days visiting here and at Madrid, Seville and Granada.

EARL DAVID BEATTY, BRITISH NAVAL HERO, PASSED LAST EVENING

Had Brilliant Career in Service of His Country, Rising From Bottom to Highest Rank—Battle of Jutland Was Crowning Point

LONDON, March 11: (CP)—Earl David Beatty, aged 55, former Admiral of the Fleet, passed away last night. He suffered a chill while attending the funeral of the late King George and developed a heart ailment after which his condition became serious. For several days his recovery had been despaired of. He was placed on the retired list last January 17.

BELGRADE, Jugo-Slavia, March 11:—Premier Stoyadinovich has resigned as head of the government of Jugo-Slavia after having failed in efforts to form a new ministry. A number of his ministers had deserted him following the attempted assassination of Stoyadinovich in Parliament on Friday.

Monarch Asks House To Amend Civil List To Provide For Queen

Interesting Message Read in Parliament Today by Chancellor of Exchequer Chamberlain—Suggestion Made in Missive From Edward VIII Himself

LONDON, March 11: (CP)—The possibility that King Edward VIII may marry was officially announced in the House of Commons today when Rt. Hon. Neville Chamberlain, Chancellor of the Exchequer, read a message from the King pointing out the necessity of revising the civil list—amounts paid to the Royal Family—and desiring that the contingency of his marriage be taken into account so that there should be provision for the Queen.

DIES AT McBRIDE

Louis C. Jamieson, Hotel Proprietor, Was Well Known Pioneer Of Interior Country

Word has been received in the city of the sudden death early yesterday morning at McBride of Louis C. Jamieson, well known pioneer hotel proprietor of that interior point.

The late Mr. Jamieson had been a resident of McBride since railway construction days, having come in there from the United States as a brakeman on the Grand Trunk Pacific. Later he established stores at McBride and Tete Jaune and eventually went into the hotel business. Deceased, whose death will be regretted by many friends throughout the interior, was about sixty years of age. His wife died last summer. He leaves two sons, Thomas Jamieson, who is in the service of the B. and N. Department of the Canadian National Railways at Tye near here, and Lyon Jamieson, at McBride, and a married daughter in Seattle.

GOING TO SEATTLE

Settlement Made in Maid of Orleans Salvage and Vessel to Return South

Settlement has been made in connection with the salvage of the auxiliary schooner Maid of Orleans which stranded and sank two weeks ago on Sarah Island near Milbank Sound and the Armour Salvage Co. is now carrying out sufficient reconditioning of the vessel to enable her to return to her home port of Seattle. It is expected she will leave for the south about Friday with Capt. E. Larsen, her regular master, in command. Certain perishable goods from the vessel's cargo are being disposed of locally.

Visit to Alberta Would Be Premature States Douglas; Groundwork Needed First

EDMONTON, March 11: (CP)—Major C. H. Douglas, originator of the Social Credit plan, in a cable yesterday from London to Premier William Aberhart, said that a visit to Alberta by him "would be premature" until such time as the provincial government's main policy had been agreed upon. Major Douglas' reply to Premier Aberhart's request that he come to Alberta by March 30 was: "Early reduction of taxation on individuals and property, rejection of the federal loan council, redemption and eventual extinction of Alberta's debt by Alberta's credit as explained are not details but are urgent, primary and essential steps in social credit and social dividends. Until the main policy is agreed upon a visit by me would be premature."
